



SAFE BOATING WEEK

The theme this year for Safe Boating Week was "Think Before You Drink"! Unfortunatly, we did not receive any information until several days before Safe Boating Week was to start, so I took things into my own hands and took the opportunity to introduce the Boaters Emergency Life Line to the Duluth public.

I had written several letters to newspapers in hopes that they would print the articles on Sunday, June 2nd which was the start of Safe Boating Week. The Hermantown Star and the Duluth Budgeteer both had the articles out but the Duluth Herald did not. I took it upon myself to write a letter and express my feelings as to the fact that they omitted my article. To my surprise, I got a call from one of the newspaper people and they did print a very nice article. I was also invited to the Coast Guard station to meet with and have an interview which was on two of the local radio stations. Also later that week, Dr. Wessel from St. Mary's Hospital was on tv explaining the B-E-L-L system and the Duluth Power Squadron was given credit for their work in setting this system up.

So, all in all, we did get three newspaper articles, two radio interviews, and one TV broadcast. Not bad!

Hopefully, next year we will receive information from the National Safe Boating Committee in time to promote something which is important to all of us ... SAFE BOATING!

SOME SOBERING FACTS

Over 1200 people die in boating accidents every year.

90% of them drown

Drowning is the third leading cause of accidental death in the U.S.

Over 50% of those drowning involved alcohol.

The Coast Guard estimates the number of non-fatal boating accidents to be 60,000 or higher with property damage well over \$100 million annually.

One 12-oz. beer contains the same amount of alcohol as 4 ounces of 12% wine or 1½ oz. of 86 proof liquor.

Diluting an alcoholic beverage with water or fruit juice slows absorption. Mixing alcohol with a carbonated beverage increases absorption and intoxicates you faster.

Cold showers and coffee will only produce a clean, wide-awake drunk. Only your liver can detoxify alcohol. For each drink you consume it takes approximately two hours to sober up.

In moderate amounts, alcohol dilates the small blood vessels close to the skin, giving a deceptive "glow" of warmth. In fact, the dilated blood vessels reduce your body's ability to guard against heat loss.

Research shows that 4 hours exposure to noise, vibration, sun, glare, wind, and other motion on the water produces a kind of "boaters hypnosis" or fatigue, which slows reaction time almost as much as if you were legally drunk. Adding alcohol to boating stress factors intensifies their effects. Each drink multiplies your accident risk.


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FCC ELIMINATES LICENSE FOR MARINE VHF RADIOS

Boat owners no longer need to obtain a restricted radio operator's permit to use a VHF radio. The Federal Communications Commission has changed its rules to eliminate the license requirement for maritime and aviation users. While boaters do not need a license to operate a VHF on U.S. waters, they still need a license for VHF operation outside the U.S. and for "MF" and "HF" single sideband transmissions on all waters. Since the permits were issued to anyone who applied, they were relatively meaningless and an administrative burden, according to the FCC.

LAKE SUPERIOR

Boaters on Western Lake Superior spent an average of 42 days boating in 1984, almost doubling the number they spent in 1976, according to a survey conducted by the Minnesota Sea Grant. The average boater on western Lake Superior in 1984 was very similar to the 1976 boater, but the survey points out a couple notable differences: the 1984 boater more often resides in Duluth/Superior or the Minneapolis/St. Paul area (65%) and he has fewer people residing in his household.

Also according to the survey, the average boater is 47 years old, male, has been boating on Lake Superior for 12.6 years, and has owned his present boat for six years.

Those surveyed either berthed their boats at marinas in the study area or were members of boating clubs or associations in western Lake Superior. Thus, the study does not represent day users who trailered their boats to the area.



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



The Washburn Marina is located on Lake Superior adjacent to the Apostle Island National Park. It is a new facility which offers complete services for the boater. Some of these services are;

Well stocked ships store offering charts, ice marine parts and accesories and also fishing licenses and souvenir items.

138 slips for boats of all sizes with wide walkways, power and city water at each slip. Also 24 hour security.

A boaters lounge is located upstairs on the harbor side of the main building with cable TV, microwave and pizza oven.

A large service dock with pumpstation gasoline, diesel fuel and a courteous staff to provide services from early morning to until past midnight.

Clean and spacious showers and restrooms are available.

A 150 Ton open-end Travelift can accommodate all sizes of boats.

For trailerable boats, there is a ramp with daily and annual ramp passes available.

Sailboat Charters are available at the marina for those who wish to rent either bareboat or captianed.

Fishing Charters are also available thru the marina. The boats are all well appointed twin engine cruisers USCG approved and have the latest equipment on board. All captains are USCG licensed with many years of experience.



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

This store offers the largest wine selection in the North. Also, stop in for soda, mixes, ice and snacks.






Buoys to mark sport, refuge areas



BUOYS WILL MARK LINE — BAYFIELD — In September of 1981, the State of Wisconsin and the Red Cliff Band of Lake Superior Chippewa signed an agreement that established "sport fishing only" areas and "fish refuge" areas in the area of Chequamegon Bay. Several of the agreed-upon boundary lines were at considerable distances from navigational aids and both sport and commercial fishermen had some difficulty knowing precisely where these boundary lines were located. Since 1983, a navigation buoy system has been established with U.S. Coast Guard approval in the area south of Madeline Island and also in the Saxon Harbor area to alleviate some of the navigational difficulties. The sport only line shown on the above map running eastward from Grants Point to the Gull Island Refuge has five buoys along it, each with an identifying number on its top. The buoys on the

Grants Point-Gull Island refuge line are even numbered, 2, 4, 6, 8 and 10, running west to east. The buoys on the line have a legend that reads "sport only," except for buoy number 10, located on the refuge line that reads "fish refuge."On Sept. 1, the "sport only" line drops back to its original spring position with the appropriate even numbered buoys. Effective this year, there are five buoys marking the western boundary of the Gull Island Refuge. Previously there were only two. These buoys reading "fish refuge" are numbered 5, 12, 10, 14 and 16. The Saxon sport area's northern boundary with the Gull Island Refuge will be marked during the open water season with four buoys marked "fish refuge," and are numbered with the odd numbers 7, 9, 11 and 13, west to east. Buoy number 13 will mark the Wisconsin-Michigan state line along with the refuge line.
