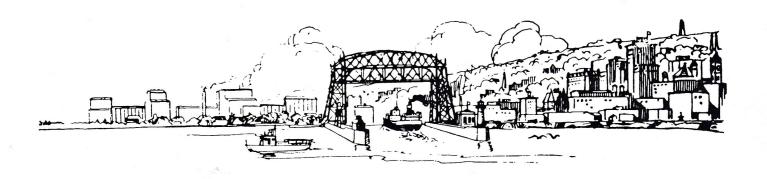

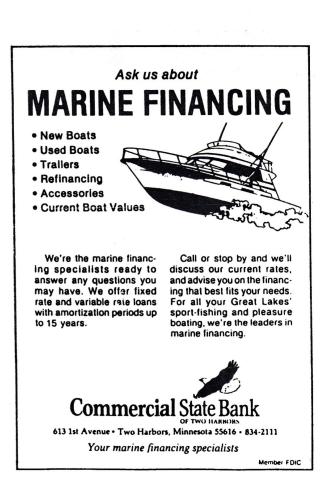
#### **COMING ATTRACTIONS**

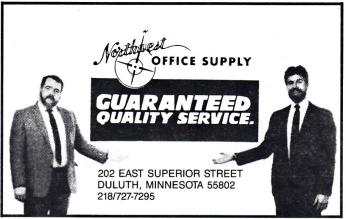

## meet your commander -Ken Johnson, Jn

Ken Johnson, JN, was sworn in on March 6, 1988 as the Duluth Power Squadrons new Commander. Ken has been a Squadron member for a number of years. He has completed four Squadron courses. ### DISTRICT 10 COUNCIL REPORT

Then Commander Hengel, then Executive Officer Ken Johnson and Squadron Education Officer Candy Hengel went to the District Council Meeting at Stevens Point, Wi. on February 5 & 6. The Council meeting is to get together Commanders, Executive Officers and other members of the Squadron Bridge to update them on the workings of National and the District. This also is a time for the incoming Commanders to meet District members and have sessions on meeting format and form completions.

The meeting was from Saturday morning through the afternoon. Some of the information and high litesare as follows:

National has requested that any attorney members of the Squadron that have expertise in copywriting litigation, non-profit corporation tax and real estate transactions are to let the district commander know. There will be a 1989 cruise that will involve all Squadrons. It will be a District by District activity but activated through National. More information to come later this year. Coop Charting has been active in many Squadrons including Duluth, but there are 6 Squadrons in our District of 11 Squadrons that have not participated. Minnetonka Squadron has a professionally made video depicting their activities and helping to explain what their Squadron does. This video is shown at the Public Boating Course and also at various community presentations they attend.

Frank Golle, Commander of Minnetonka Squadron gave a session on "Leadership & Motivation". It was informative and energizing.

Hal Fotch, District Law Officer gave his presentation "Nuts & Bolts of Being a Commander, Part II-1988". He went over the many forms necessary to keep all areas of the Squadron going. He also outlined the timing for when to expect specific requests for reports. He gave helpful hints on how to maintain records and stressed accuracy on all submittals. Deadlines can be deadly if not done properly and on time.

Treasurers report was given indicating that District 10 is fiscally sound. Notation was made that the District 10 Bridge members attended the National Conference in Miami in January. District 10 had a 100% attendance of there bridge.

The Prince Henry award was discussed. This award is given to a Squadron within our District that has achievements of advanced grades in JN & N. The formula will be looked at and possably modified as there is not an appropriate procedure at this time. We thought Duluth had a strong chance of getting the trophy but it went to a Squadron that did not graduate any JN or N students in 1987. Duluth graduated 6 JN and 6 N students in that time. Hopefully there will be answers at the Spring Conference in April at Appleton, Wi..

Commander Hengel submitted for consideration the Duluth Squadron to host the fall 1989 Conference. That will be 50 years for the Duluth Squadron and to help celebrate that we want to host the Conference.

We returned home late Saturday night, tired but committed more than ever to continue to promote safe boating through education.

#### NOTES & QUOTES From Dick Bibby . . .

Tugboats have fascinated me since I was very young. The old steam tugs, the modern day diesel tugs, forever performing their tasks of Salvage and Rescue, Harbor Towing, open sea towing, etc. Small, very powerful and highly maneuverable, the tugboat has been an indispensable part of our marine transportation system.

The majority of our Squadron skippers are well familiar with the long idle tug *Essayons* which has been quietly resting in retirement in Slip No. 2 at the foot of 8th Avenue West, just off Railroad Street. Many of us have picked up a clue from her weathered and rusting after "rub rail" during a Treasure Hunt event. Age shows in her lines and her once bright red paint has been long since flaking away since the Zenith Dredge Company took her off the job back in the summer of 1965.

I thought it would be fitting and proper to fill this space for this issue with a "thumbnail" sketch of this grand old lady, now in retirement, which was once the most powerful work horse at the Head of the Lakes.

The Essayons was built in 1908 by the Racine Boat Manufacturing Company of Muskegon, Michigan, for the U.S. Army Corps of Engineers. She came to Duluth in the spring of 1909, having been specifically designed for work on the Superior entry. Work had begun on the widening of the Duluth Ship Canal in 1898 and in the process the old wooden piers were replaced with new concrete ones. New piers and protective breakwaters were also begun at Superior in 1903, but that project was plagued with problems. Protective works were built to shelter the construction at Superior, but three times in a row were demolished by Nor'westers on the open lake. The work was suspended in 1906 for a complete review by a special Board of Engineers. Before work was resumed, extensive work facilities were moved to the end of Minnesota Point to facilitate construction and the 85-foot steel tug Essayons was designed and built explicitly for the project. A smaller Ada Barrett, a 55-foot wooden tug, had been purchased by the Corps for the job in 1903, but was too small.

The Essayons measured 86' 6" overall, with a 22' 2" beam and a depth of 11' 6". She drew 11' 0" light and displaced some 172 long tons. She was powered by a two cylinder "fore and aft" compound steam engine from the Montague Iron Works, rated at 450 horsepower. The tug had 16- and 34-inch cylinders and a 26-inch stroke. Steam was furnished by a Johnston Brothers scotch boiler at 175 pounds, her plant giving her a speed of 11.0 miles per hour light, or 6.0 miles per hour with a loaded scow. The Essayons cost the government \$35,950 to build. One of the tug's most distinctive features was the row of oversized portholes circling her main cabin. On delivery to the Corps, she was given the name Essayons, the French word which was adopted in 1866 as the motto of the Army Engineers meaning, "We Will Try."

As she was intended to do, the *Essayons* began her Corps career serving a couple of years at the Superior entry job. In 1915 she was joined by the larger sea-going tug *Col. C.B. Sears* and the 110-foot dipper dredge *Col. D.D. Galliard* a year later.

The Essayons and the Galliard were paired together most of the time for the next thirty years, principally engaged in maintenance dredging, but on several occasions were delegated to new work, such as major harbor deepening jobs or harbor improvements. Most of their time was spent in the Twin Ports and the Keweenaw Waterway.

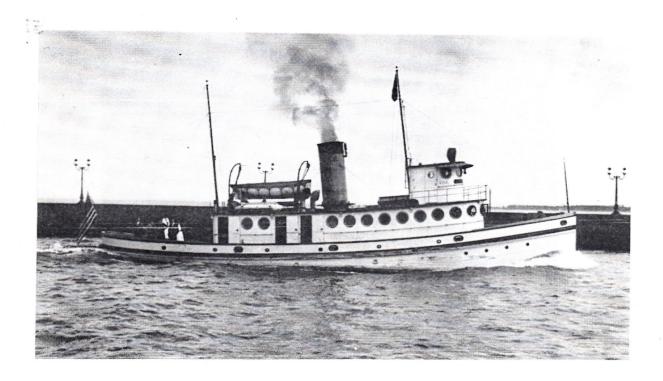
In the mid-30s, the *Essayons* and the *Sears* took the *Galliard* and her scows down to Sandusky, Toledo and Detroit, where they worked during 1934 and 1935, wintering at the Soo and working the St. Marys River during the season. After the Second World War, two big diesel tugs were brought to the Head of the Lakes from the coast, both Army veterans built during the war. The 105-foot *Maj. Emil H. Block* was renamed the *Lake Superior* and the 85-foot *Lt. Col. John H. Adams* became the *Marquette*. Both vessels arrived in Duluth in 1947 and the *Essayons* was offered for sale a year later.

Essayons was purchased in December 1948 by the Zenith Dredge Company of Duluth. Taking the place of the older tug Columbia, the Essy tended the derrick barge Adele and her scows, while the larger Zenith tug William H. Whitney did the heavier towing and for a time at least handled the big wooden dredge Alice Vivian. Essayons and her charges worked around the harbors at Duluth and Superior and up the shore to Taconite Harbor and Two Harbors.

In the summer of 1965, some changes were made to *Essayons*'s machinery, and her crankshaft lubricating system was changed to a gravity-feed outfit. As the summer wore on, the tug worked in and around Bayfield and the Chief Engineer began to experience persistent overheating problems. The *Essy* was taken off the job and returned to the Zenith docks in Duluth for repairs. She never sailed again as the repairs were deemed too expensive to undertake, particularly in view of her age and her outdated steam power plant. All thoughts of ever sailing the *Essayons* again ended in 1976 when the tug's old engine was removed and donated by Zenith Dredge Company to the Corps of Engineers for a display in their expanded Marine Museum at Canal Park. Company officials have obviously delayed scrapping the old husky, and have deemed it possible to perhaps repower the old tug hull in the future. Meanwhile many thousands of visitors will continue to come to the Museum and have the opportunity to see the workings of the *Essayons* while her hull keeps watch over the harbor where she spent so many years at labor.

Perhaps the next time we cruise by the old girl's retirement berth it would be fitting and proper to blow her a short salute.

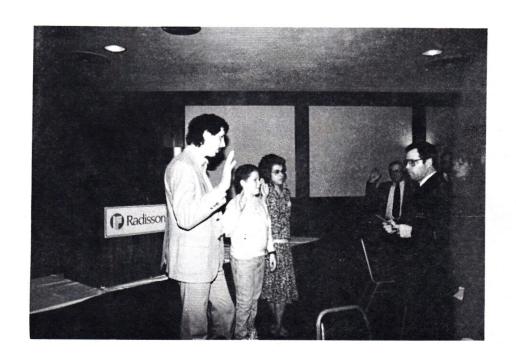


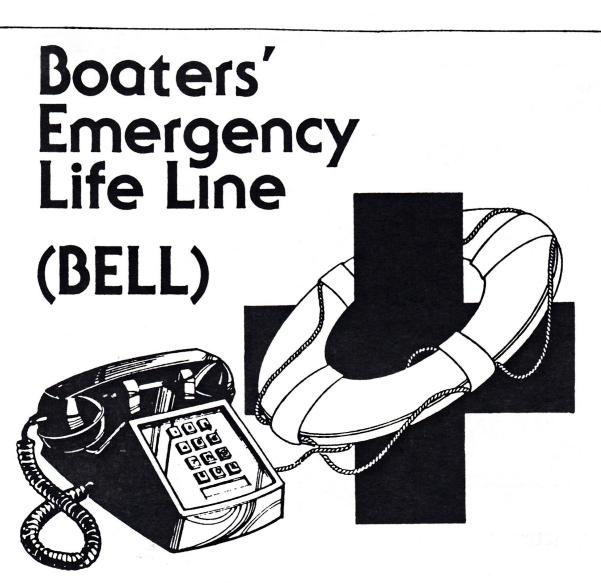
