Test results are back. Bill Carlson, Owen Erickson and James Robinson have all passed the open and closed book exams of the Navigation course. With the completion and acceptance of their sight folders, they will have earned the advanced grade of Navigator. AND, speaking of Navigator, Mary & Gil Richey, who are lolling their way around in the South Seas, have both been awarded the advanced grade of Navigator. KUDOS to you both. We all wish we were with you.

PUBLIC SAIL & BOAT COURSE: The second class began 24 February with 65 students. They will soon write their test, and we hope to see many of them come aboard as new members in the Squadron. Many thanks to Mark Anderson for the outstanding job he did with organizing and teaching. Also, many, many thanks to all who did teach a session, those who corrected papers, answered students questions, taught marlinespike, proctored classes, and I can't forget the dedicated Bridge officers who were present throughout most of these past 16 weeks. Everyone's hard work and efforts showed. We brought 15 new members on board from the first class, and most of them are currently taking both Seamanship and Piloting. Thanks to you all.

SEAMANSHIP AND PILOTING: This combined class began on 3 March 1992, and has broken all records. There are 35 signed up for Seamanship, and 53 for Piloting. We are literally bursting at the seams in the classroom. Interesting enough, 12 are brand new members, 39 are members who joined within the past 5 years, and only 2 are members for over 5 years. What an enthusiastic group. We will be in great need of class proctors mid-April/May, once students have begun the

charting portion of the course. Please contact me if you can come up and give a hand.

CRUISE PLANNING: A new course is going to be taught in the Duluth Power Squadron for the first time. CRUISE PLANNING will prepare you to take a short or extended trip, be it a few days or weeks or months! It will give you a good background to traveling anywhere, from lakes close by to rivers and waters far away, with any size and type of boat. Class will be conducted on Monday evenings, starting 13 April 1992, at the Herbert Service Center. Class will be 6 sessions in length with the 7th night for the exam. ALL Duluth Power Squadron members are encouraged to take this course. I hope to see many "seasoned" boaters in this class - we need your input on what has worked for you. 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CO-OP CHARTING OFFICER

The Co-Op Charting Officer has the responsibility of organizing a USPS volunteer effort for the Cooperative Charting Program. It is a civic service performed by USPS members for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). The intent is to assist NOAA in the production of accurate and up-to-date nautical charts and to preserve geodetic control stations in the National Geodetic Reference System. NOAA evaluates reports and awards credits to USPS volunteers who provide changes, corrections, and recommendations to improve information on charts and maps. Award credits are also earned by reporting on the condition of geodetic control stations (geodetic markers). These volunteer efforts save the United States government millions of dollars each year.

USPS awards are presented for the most credits awarded by NOAA for best District, Squadron, and individual. In addition, honor roll certificates are awarded to Districts, Squadrons, and individuals according to criteria established by USPS.

P/C Robert Byrne, N, is our Co-Op Charting

Officer. Bob has training materials, manuals, descriptions, and forms for reporting to NOAA to distribute to USPS members. The Duluth Power Squadron has a 1992 goal of maintaining honor roll status as a squadron and to organize and conduct two land searches for geodetic control stations. Bob will appreciate your help and efforts on 2 May 1992, our first Co-Op Charting date.

MYSTERY PHOTO #5 ANSWER

Some 22 years ago, back in March of 1970, our distinguished CHANNEL CHATTER ran a reminder calling attention to the District 10 Annual Spring Conference to be held at the Park Motor Inn in Madison, Wisconsin on 3, 4, 5 April of that year. The column read: "This occasion will be our own D/C Larry Cowan's "Swan Song," so please plan to attend." It further stated, "A big WELL DONE to Larry for his efforts as District Commander."

It is ironical that the little bright-eyed fellow pictured in Mystery Photo #6 will, 22 years later, also gain prominent recognition for the Duluth Squadron when he takes the pledge on 28 March at Madison's Radisson Inn as USPS District 10's new Commander. Hopefully, there will be a worthy supporting delegation from the Duluth Squadron in attendance to show our appreciation for P/C Harvey Hengel as he accepts the helm of responsibility for the leadership of the twelve District 10 Squadrons.

The correctness of Harvey's course with USPS is readily apparent. Past Commander Hengel has given inspirational leadership and has been a tireless worker with tremendous drive. Through this process he has gained the admiration and respect of both his subordinates and superiors. He has achieved

good success in the business world and has brought the same dedication and determination into his work with the United States Power Squadrons organization.

Hengel was born on a farm in Finlayson, Minnesota near the Sandstone area just off I-35. He first went to work, when only twelve years old, as a janitor and stockboy for National Tea in Hibbing. Sometime later, while still in the 9th grade, he found employment with Sammy's Pizza and remained with Sammy's through the rest of his high school days in Hibbing. During the summer months, he traveled around to the various Sammy's locations serving as a trainer and personnel supervisor and was instrumental in starting some of the new stores as well, including Duluth's 1st Street and Central Avenue pizza parlors.

Harvey graduated from Hibbing High School in 1958, moved to Rochester, Minnesota 5 days after graduation, and soon thereafter went into partnership with a gentleman by the name of Sam Perrella, Sr., who was the original owner and founder of Sammy's Pizza.

In 1962 he sold out his partnership with Perrella and went to work for American Linen continued on page 10



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Company, working up to route supervisor. While with American Linen, Hengel had a desire to somehow be involved with some civic responsibility in the immediate community, so he joined an association that was called the Police Reserve, similar to a civil defense unit. In order to become a police reserve officer, he was required to take an advanced first aid class. As fate would have it, the instructor in that initial medical care class was his present partner, John Perkins. A good friendship developed between Harvey and Perkins during the summer of 1965. Hengel relates that it all tied in as John was one of American Linen's customers on Harvey's route and he consequently asked Harvey if he would like to work for him. As a matter of interest, Perkins started Gold Cross Ambulance in 1962 on a borrowed \$1,200.

Hengel had to make a decision as American Linen had offered him a job as plant supervisor at a washing plant in the Twin Cities, which represented the next step for advancement for Harvey. He wasn't interested in the washing plant job, so he had further talks with Perkins at the infant ambulance company, and ultimately terminated his employment with American Linen and on 1 October 1965 went to work for Gold Cross.

In 1968 Harvey was given shares of the Rochester company in appreciation and recognition of his accomplishments at being instrumental in helping turn the company around to a validly prosperous operation.

On 3 April 1972, Harvey came to Duluth, Perkins stayed in Rochester, and they became equal partners continuing on in the ambulance business. The Duluth Gold Cross Ambulance operation started out with 5 employees and 3 ambulances. It was in direct competition with the former Wilcol Ambulance company, that was, at the time, unhappy with the city of Duluth's given subsidy and would not guarantee emergency

ambulance service. Ben Boo, Mayor at the time, declared a city emergency and contacted the State Health Department to see if they knew anyone that would be interested in coming to Duluth to run an ambulance company. Gold Cross was one of the five agencies contacted, and they negotiated a contract with the city, assuming that Wilcol was not going to continue their operation.

The young Gold Cross firm was awarded the contract, with the aforementioned 5 employees and 3 vehicles. Today they have 10 ambulances, 6 wheelchair units, 2 staff cars, and 40 employees and work out of two locations. This April, Gold Cross will have been offering ambulance service in Duluth for 20 years.

Any "thumbnail" sketch of P/C Harvey Hengel's life would obviously not be complete without the mention of his delightful and attractive wife, Candance. Candy was our Squadron's commander in 1989 and has proven herself to be a valuable and proficient leader in her own right. Both Harvey and Candy proudly wear the insignia for the "Educational Achievement Award," which is given only to those USPS members who have qualified in all advanced grades and elective courses. This includes the grade of "N," which is the highest awarded by USPS, and is the organization's PhD in the field of boating study.

Harvey originally met Candy in Rochester where she was working through the Clinic in one of the Rochester hospitals. They were married in May of 1974, approximately 2 years after their first meeting. Candance hails from Virginia, Minnesota and was a professional nurse.

Harvey initially started boating with a "no name" 18' fiberglass Crestliner. In those early years, he pulled the outboard behind a motor home for some 5 years, mostly sailing

the small craft in the rivers and through the lake chain in the Brainerd area. He then moved on to a 22' aluminum Crestliner named "Snoopy," which was an I/O. Onward to a 26-footer, a 30-footer, a 36-footer, and finally the graduation into their lovely 38' Carver. The Hengel's last 3 boats have carried the "Harcan" name, which is, as most would guess, a briefed down version of Harvey-Candance. In recent years, the Hengels have cruised extensively: trips that have included the North Shore all the way to Rossport, Ontario, while touching in at Thunder Bay and gaining good knowledge around the Susie Islands and the legendary Fisherman's Home on the south shore of Isle Royale. They have also cruised along the south shore of Lake Superior, in and around the favorite Apostle Islands and eastward to Houghton-Hancock, Michigan, midway through the Keewenaw Waterway.

Since taking his vows of membership in USPS back in May of 1981, P/C Harvey Hengel has outwardly displayed foresighted leadership both at the Duluth and District levels. He has demonstrated and inspired a good level of high pride, competence, and good morale in all planes, right down to the newest members who have just taken their pledges. Alternating between sea duty, Squadron shoreside assignments, and running an important local business, Harvey's leadership has been highly successful and infectious. He came up through the ranks here in Duluth and was elected Commander in 1987.

Hengel became involved with District matters some 4 years ago, serving in each administrative position for a term of one year. It is revealed that a competent district commander does accept an awesome burden of responsibility with tireless schedules involving numerous far-reaching appearances coupled with important decision making. Although well in advance of actually becoming District

10's new commander, the Hengel's year started in January with their appearance at the Annual National Meeting in Miami. In early February it was the Winter Council Meeting in Wausau, Wisconsin, followed by consecutive weekend showings at District Changes of Watch, that sometimes involved double duty with Operations Training presentations and other various special meetings. The Hengels estimate they will have traveled some 6,300 miles between January and 28 March when Harvey will be come District Commander.

For over 26 years, Gold Cross and Harvey Hengel have been involved in community, regional, state and national emergency medical service, and has, as well, generously supported and participated in numerous local non-EMS organizations and activities. As many of us make plans to go down to Madison, there reigns a happy air of excitement. All hands are very proud of this unique gentleman. We congratulate him and wish him well in this now increasingly involved role as USPS District 10's top skipper. Good luck, Harvey!!!!

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
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MEMBERSHIP RECOGNITION
