

Is Cellular The Answer?

I confess to being dismayed when beginning Lake Superior boating again after a 7 year absence and finding no radiotelephone service. The ability to contact a land line directly can be critical for emergencies and special messages.

What about cellular? It's great in a vehicle but, we found, even better on a boat. We have a 3 watt Motorola on Selchie with only its built-in antenna and recently gave it the acid test on our July 4th trip to the Apostles. (The weather was great, by the way, and Maron and Kelly caught a 30# redfin.)

Our carrier is US West Cellular and we had excellent local service up to Sand Island. I would imagine an outside antenna would have extended local service somewhat – certainly to Bear and Rocky Islands.

Approaching Red Cliff, however, the roam signal flashed and we soon were receiving a strong signal from Celulink in Ashland. The reception remained strong throughout the islands – even to the end of Outer.

Cost? Just a few dollars more a month than a regular phone and, of course, no installation fee. Per minute costs vary from about .40-.45 during peak hours to about .17 off peak. Roaming costs are higher – \$3.00/day and about .95/min. Obviously you'll want to try to make most of your calls the same day and keep them short to keep costs down.

The cost of the phone, itself, varies considerably, but be sure to get a 3 watt. \$100-300 is usual, but usually includes free air time. Ours cost only \$1.00 but, obviously, included no free time.

Coverage along the North Shore has gaps, but they could be narrowed considerably with a good antenna.

Is it worth it? We wouldn't be without cellular. Imagine anchoring late in the evening at Justice Bay at Sand Island and being able to call home for just .17/min.!

National Safe Boating Week

5 June to 11 June 1994 was recognized as National Safe Boating Week across the United States. Guest represented the Minnesota and Wisconsin Department of Natural Resources and the U.S. Coast Guard. We were given a perfect opportunity to build relations between the five organizations. We all are charged with the task of promoting safe boating, educating, and informing the public and users of our waterways. Our Squadron seized the opportunity and made the most of it.

Members of our Squadron assembled and distributed over 400 packets of information concerning safe boating and US, MN and Wisc boating regulations. Thanks to all who helped on this project.

Twenty-five municipalities in our region responded to our request and proclaimed Safe Boating Week in their towns and cities.

Courtesy Marine Exams were conducted at the Power Squadron Dock on 11 June. Over 30 squadron members had their boats examined.

The Coast Guard demonstrated flares, lighted buoys, and survival suits. They gave tours of the 44 ft. search and rescue vessel stationed here. The Coast Guard supervised a Squadron Members flare shoot that afforded us hands-on experience.

Member Howard Boynton organized and supervised a hands-on fire extinguisher shoot. Both of these events were helpful to many of the youths that were enrolled in the Squadron Boating Safely Course.

Duluth Squadron Members should feel proud of their squadron's efforts in this National Promotion. I am. Thanks everyone for their contribution.



Boating Safely







First Mate's Locker is located at Lake Breeze Motel Resort. It has evolved over the past couple years from a gift nook located in the motel office to the present larger space. 
