

On the Cover

August 19th was the day the replica of a British 1700s tall ship, with only 4 feet to spare and calm seas, entered the Duluth Harbor, to be part of the Port of Duluth Festival. The HMS Rose is 179 feet long and 130 feet to the top of the main mast. The HMS Rose is the largest active wooden tall ship. The original was a 24 gun frigate that reportedly carried a crew of 202 men. Today it is a working ship with a regular crew of 20 and about 29 that pay to sail and work the ship.




Commander's Update







3 way split on one half Other half goes to National for support of the new headquarters IOPIRNC


1540 Wind still SW at 8 MPH. Still heavy overcast. Forty-one boats, one motor home, two trailers and several outboards at the dock.


