

Predicted Log Contest


The Predicted Log Contest was held on 19 August 1995, starting and ending at the Squadron Dock.

The Predicted Log is a contest to test a skippers ability to follow a preset compass course, using only a compass and a tachometer. An observer tells you when to change your direction from a time sheet the skipper has pre-determined. The winner is determined by how close the skipper actually takes to run the course compared to the amount of time the skipper has calculated it to take. A formula is then used to determine the winner.







The entire weekend will be set to a Tropical Island theme - "Tropical Duluth - We're Hot Hot".



Tips for Small Craft Boaters

Article reprinted from <u>Soundings</u>, June/July 1995 Issue. <u>Soundings</u> is the newsletter for the American Steamship Company.

With pleasure boating in full force across the Great Lakes' waterways, it is imperative that all boaters follow safe boating guidelines. Here are a few tips to help ensure a fun and safe summer for all those engaged in lake and river related activities.

Might Does Make Right

Even at just two to three miles per hour, a commercial freighter requires thousands of feet just to come to a complete stop. At 10 m.p.h., that distance stretches out to a mile or more. Turning to avoid a collision is also not an option in most rivers, where vessels must remain within the narrow, dredged channel. Remember: the huge size of many modern vessels - often longer than three football fields - mean they have limited maneuvering choices. In any meeting between a commercial ship and a small pleasure craft, the commercial ship has the right-of-way under navigation rules.

Danger

Five or more short blasts from a ship's whistle is the international signal for danger. Smaller craft should take avoidance measures immediately (in other words, GET OUT OF THE WAY!)

Radio Channels

Pleasure boaters with VHF marine radios can establish contact with commercial ships (and the Coast

Guard) by using Ch16 (156.800 MHz). However, be prepared to change channels after initial contact - the channel is often crowded with important radio traffic.

Thrusters

Most modern commercial ships are equipped with bow and/or stern thrusters which use powerful sidewise motors to maneuver. These can be turned on at any time and could quickly swamp a small craft near their outlets. Small boaters should keep well away from a commercial ship's bow or stern to avoid thruster wash and turbulence from the ship's main propeller.

Visibility

Pilothouses on many newer ships are located near the stern of the vessel - an arrangement that places the navigation bridge several hundred feet astern of the bow. This creates a blind spot immediately ahead of the ship and beneath the bow. Beware - officers on the bridge may not see you if you get too close. If you can't see the pilothouse clearly, then they can't see you.

Fog

Commercial vessels have two or more radar arrays to "see" objects at different distances. In fog, however, some pleasure boats are too small to produce a return (blip) on radar. Small boat skippers should never assume a ship's captain or mate can determine his or her location, especially in fog.


