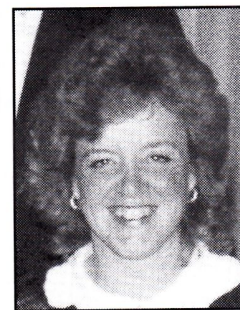

COMPASS FORCE

As I am standing at the helm, looking forward to the horizon, my gaze is never far from my compass, sitting patiently and unassuming just in front of me. I enjoy it's gentle swing, free of any readout, blinking LCD lights, beeps or demands for 'input'. It just works its magic hour after hour, day after day without needing to be plugging in, or programmed. With it, in the dark, fog or far from shore I can proceed in confidence because of the quiet magic of its magnetic dance with its partner. Geomagnetism is a powerful partner, encompassing (there is a good word) the earth from pole to pole with lines of invisible force. We can sometimes see this partner on a dark night, dancing with others, over the north pole. There, electrons and protons from the sun are led in, impacting other molecules, which glow with their characteristic color.

This compass is an instrument of simple concept, improved over the centuries into this low maintenance, highly accurate tool for navigators. I read that the Chinese are credited with the first use of the compass, their "South Governor" or "South Pointer" being used about 300 B.C. This instrument was a carved piece of lodestone in the shape of a ladle that when spun on a smooth bronze plate always came to rest with the handle pointing South. A Chinese improvement on the South Governor was a magnetic needle hanging from a single silk strand, sensitive enough to discover declination, or the difference between magnetic north and true north, long before it was known in the West. But even this tool was preceded by thousands of years of serious, and I expect often playful exploration of the properties of lodestone. I can picture this early research into the physics of fundamental forces performed by a child amusing himself or herself with pieces of lodestone, chasing and capturing little pieces with a playmate on the cave floor. And perhaps they placed small pieces on wood chips floating in a puddle, and moved the chips with another piece of lodestone. Eventually, observation would reveal that left undisturbed they would attain one particular orientation. Such magic!

Even today it seems magic to me. Without the touch of matter on matter, magnetic force from the earth reaches out and caresses my compass. I walk through this force everyday, not seeing or feeling it, yet it gently guides my wandering compass card, overcomes its inertia and swings it back North. We live with magnetism and its wonders, like refrigerator decorations, motors and MRI devices, accepting them, some persons even knowing the mechanics of them intimately.

Still to me it is a mystery that does not go away when I read about the physics of fundamental forces of the atom, of quantum theory, of QED or Quantum ElectroDynamics. But then, even gravity is a grand mystery to me. Perhaps I need to just go back to my compass, brush up on TVMDC, and recheck my deviation table.

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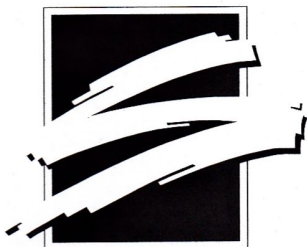

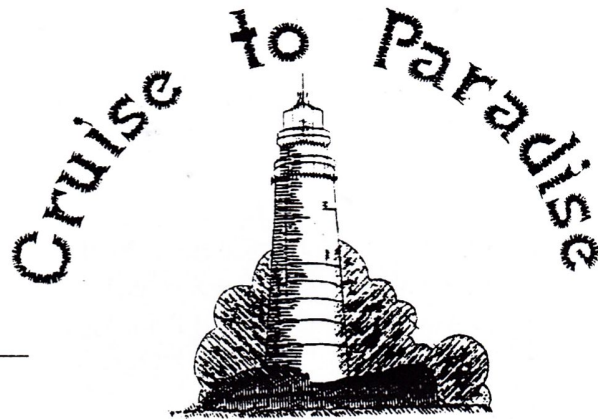

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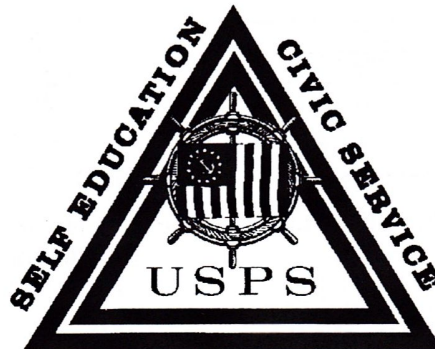

What is a Governing Board?

The Governing Board is the board of directors of USPS. It controls management, finances and policies of the national organization and regulates the policies of Districts and Squadrons.

Several years ago, the National Meetings Committee selected Minneapolis as the location for the 1998 Fall Governing Board, with District 10 hosting. The meeting will be held at the downtown Minneapolis Marriott City Center 23 - 27 September 1998.

Who does what?

The National Meetings Committee makes most of the contractual arrangements, invites VIP's, makes most meal selections, assigns meeting rooms and times, coordinates AV requirements and OK's the final bills. They also work closely with the local committee.

What does the local host district do?

This article will highlight the local committees and their responsibilities for the 1998 Fall Governing Board. Committees are broken into two types -- **Activities** that make a Governing Board more enjoyable and **Operations** that make a Governing Board function.

Activities Committees
