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
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
Administrative Officer's Report

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Underway with Education by Asst. SEO Steve Balliette, AP

March, 2001



Boating is hard for us during the long winters in Northern Minnesota. No cruising on those crystal bright waters of Lake Superior. No moonlit cruises up the St. Louis River with the cool breeze making a jacket feel welcome. I have busied myself some this winter with putting together the notes and pictures from our cruise to New York which brought back all the

good memories of warm nights, bright stars, good friends, good food at the Riv Bistro in Midland, Ontario (thank you, Dorothy) and the occasional worrisome crossings of big water.

I am also busy with the two Public Boating courses we offer each winter. The first one concluded with 12 students passing the final exam. I think Steve Farrell signed seven of them for membership. At the Duluth Boat Show we got a list of twenty six more people interested in the second class which runs on Thursdays through April 5. Come up and visit us at Duluth Central High between 6 and 9 PM, room 111. I expect a large class this time.

Last Spring we had a Piloting Class in which a group of diligent students spent many hours learning charts, charting, TVMDC, 60D=ST and other tools for successful use of dead reckoning on board their boats. Not all the students passed, so come Fall we did a workshop for them, re-tested and now we have nine New Pilots in the Duluth Power Squadron. Congratulations to James Axtell, Janet Axtell, Mark Jennings, John Taffe, Robert Cleveland, George Sennhauser, Charlie Grubb, Ken Docteur, and Dennis Kwapick. It has been a long road for these students, but they persisted and have their new grade. Thanks for being patient.

After Change of Watch Steve Farrell will be the new SEO. This is a big job and we have a strong member now to do the job. Lets all pitch in and help Steve Farrell promote safe boating through education in the Duluth and surrounding area.

On that subject, I spoke at the Boat Show with Mr. Dave Durrant, Training Officer for the Tower Fire Department. They have a boat that his crew uses on Lake Vermillion to respond to fire and rescue calls to the lake community. He feels they need some training regarding the elements of safe boating and would like us to provide a course tailored to their needs. I think we can do that, not only to his crew, but to other departments in the area. This could

give us more opportunity to bring the Public Boating or Boat Smart class to residents away from Duluth, who do most of their boating on the inland lakes. I also got a call from a man in Grand Rapid recently, interested in the Public Boating Course. I guess our reputation is good out there since friends of his took the course and strongly recommended it to him. He was also accepting of the possibility of teaching the course himself someday in the Grand Rapids/ Walker area. We can support him in this. I would need instructors willing to go for the day or weekend to these areas to do classes. The Tower folks will pay mileage and motel. Any volunteers.?

Assisting us in this task will be the new American Boating Course due for release in July. This is an Internet based course where the students will be referred to a local US Power Squadron for formal testing. I can see us arranging trips to other areas where we present some of the course material in person and then proctor a test for the local students. This can save lives. I am sure that Tower Fire Department would rather support safe boating classes then have to pull bodies out of the lake like they have to do now each year.

By the time this is published you may have missed the special Heavy Weather Boat Handling class done for us by the US Coast Guard, chaired by member Bob Shutes. Thank you, Bob for your efforts in putting together this important program.

Weather will have tested out on March 1. We definitely want to do that class again. If any of you have the opportunity to be in contact with Dave Anderson or the staff at the National Weather Service be sure to thank them for their efforts at putting on this class.

Seamanship will begin April 16, 2001 at Duluth Central High School. I know a lot of you have not had that class. This time it will run for only six weeks. Instructor/members of the Duluth Power Squadron will be there to guide you through the subject matter, learning about marlinespike, hull design, Nautical Etiquette and more. If you cannot attend all classes you may self study the text at home, attend when you can and test with the class on May 21. You will be a more confident boater when you are done.

If a crewman is standing watch on the weather side of the bow, he will be subject to the constant beating of the sea and the ocean spray. He will be under the weather.

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
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As the Crow Flies



Pooped


The poop is the stern section of a ship. To be pooped is to be swamped by a high following sea.

Calabash What is it?

A big THANK-YOU to Power Squadron member, David F. Poulin! After reading the February-March issue of Channel Chatter, David called to let me know the real origin of the Sacred Calabash award. (My apologies to Ginny Soetebier who I quoted in last month's issue. She actually gave me most of the following information when we spoke on the phone. I was speaking to her from

my cellular phone while driving down Central Entrance... and by the time I was able to write notes about our conversation, I had forgotten many details. I hope you can forgive me, Ginny!) David was kind enough to photocopy and mail me a copy of the June-July 1946 issue of The Ensign. Note that David's father was the first recipient of the award! Here is an article reprinted from page 16 and 17 of that 1946 publication:

THE SACRED CALABASH

Or the Boomerang that Came Home To Boom By K.M. BROOK, Past Commander Duluth Squadron

At Duluth Power Squadron's annual Award Dinner the 14th of February, 1941, a unique and unusual trophy was presented. Through an appropriate deed of gift, member K. M. Brook (now Past Commander) donated to the Squadron his brainchild, the 'Sacred Calabash'.

The deed of gift emphasized that insufficient recognition seems to be given to the 'human' aspects of Squadron work and proposed that this trophy be awarded annually to the member caught with the biggest boner of the season.

Past Comdr. Brook had in mind utility as well as beauty in his conception of this trophy, and it was just natural that the flash of inspiration should occur during a post-classroom session one evening at our local Metropole Bar (Adv.). The 'Sacred Calabash' is a standard 32-ounce glass beer growler which has been suitably etched with proper and appropriate figures symbolic of Squadron work.

Mr. Brook lays credit for the title 'Sacred Calabash' to the Polynesians of antiquity. Members attending USPS Annual Meetings of recent years will recall Commodore J. F. Hellweg's story of the priestly navigators of those days who were alleged to have handed down from generation to generation their own crude but effective version of the sextant—a gourd or calabash appropriately punctured with peepholes for the observation of star altitudes. Admiral High Rodman's 'Yarns of a Kentucky Admiral' has made

reference to the 'Calabash', particularly in Capter VII, which he fittingly titles 'Some Nautical Feats of the Hawaiians and OTHERS'.

The first recipient of the 'Sacred Calabash' trophy was present Comdr. F. J. Poulin, the occasion having been a somewhat careless encounter between his vessel's stern and a channel buoy which was observed by Brook. Poulin was charged with failure to observe the rule that if the bearing of an object does not change, danger of collision can be deemed to exist. While Poulin put up a reasonably plausible alibi, the Squadron's opinion prevailed and he was charged to cherish the trophy and display it prominently on his mantelpiece.

The second holder of the 'Sacred Calabash' turned out to be Jarl Syverston, who admitted to extreme negligence in considering the buoyancy and stability characteristics of his dinghy while operating said skiff in a towing capacity. Since the occasion for towing was alone sufficient to hang him, Jarl's admission was construed as pure modesty.

Award for the 1943 season proved the boomerang

mentioned in our sub-title. Brook was accused of the original sin of buoy-bouncing! His protests that the default had occurred during the 1942 season, and only because he had instructed his landlubber helmsman to 'steer straight for that flashing white light' were feeble in view of a guilty 1943 conscience, and the boomerang stuck.

Local activity being at a minimum in 1944, no award was made.

The season of 1945, however, again provided several aspirants for the trophy's custody. Top contenders were Past Comdr. Bill Swanson for his brilliant retrieve of a heaving line with his outboard propeller during our rendezvous (plenty of witnesses), and our old friend Jarl, for his well authenticated grounding and hilarious extrication of his cruiser 'Maid Marian'. Since the witnesses to the 'Maid Marian' affair while fewer in number were adjudged in more competent condition, the Squadron ruled that Syverston be the current custodian of the 'Sacred Calabash'. That he truly and faithfully cherishes this trophy is evidenced by our accompanying photo, which was recently featured on the cover of the Sunday 'Cosmopolitan' section of the Duluth News Tribune. This shows Mr. Syverston counseling a pair of Boy Scouts, with the 'Sacred Calabash' plainly in evidence. While the trophy, the deed of gift, and the proceedings during awards are all in the spirit of good clean fun, there is still a background of serious intent. Recent Governing Board proceedings have disclosed a need for more careful seamanship among Squadron members, and mere possession of a certificate and right to fly our Ensign does not always make a careful seaman. Here in Duluth, we feel that our little reminder has been of some help in keeping the boys on their toes.

One never knows when the boomerang will boom!

The following are excerpts from a letter written by Frank J. Poulin, A.P., Commander and dated December 7, 1945:

"...The idea ...(of the Sacred Calabash) was designed to discourage sloppy seamanship among men flying our colors. It is my impression that the name Sacred Calabash was taken from Chapter VII 'Some Nautical Feats

of The Hawaiians and Others' in <u>Yarns of a Kentucky</u> <u>Admiral</u>, by Hugh Rodman Rear Admiral, U.S.N." The following are excerpts from page 132 and 133 of chapter 'The Sacred Calabash' from the book <u>Yarns Of</u>

A Kentucky Admiral:

Now, as to the calabash itself. It was more or less cylindrical, or slightly keg-shaped, made of native koa wood, and so far as I can remember, about eighteen inches in height; it might be likened to a keg with the head removed. Within a few inches of the top, four holes had been bored, spaced ninety degrees apart and on a circle whose plane was a right angles to the longitudinal axis; or on one of the upper hoops of the keg. As they gained latitude to the northward the calabash was filled with water up to the holes. Through any one of these holes, and over the opposite upper rim of the calabash, observations were made on the North Star, until, still observing through the hole, it became tangent to the upper rim. When this condition obtained the course was to be immediately changed to west, and could be altered from time to time, if necessary, so that Polaris would remain apparently tangent. This would insure their keeping in the approximate latitude of Hawaii and arrival at that island in due course of time.

As a matter of fact, though crude, this method used for the return voyage, and particularly the use of the calabash for finding Hawaii, is not only based on scientific principle, no matter what may have led to its discovery and adoption, but is practically, in a modified way, one of the most general methods of finding latitude today by the North Star. In fact a sextant may be used on the same general principle if it be set at a constant angle and used in the same way.

Power Squadron members, Tracy and Jan Nelson, became acquainted with the vegetable/fruit, Calabash, when traveling in the Caribbean this winter. The exterior is a tough dark green skin. The inside is similar to pumpkin or sweet potato...and they ate it both as a

vegetable with butter, salt & pepper and also as a dessert served as a pudding with sugar, cinnamon and nutmeg. Yum! At craft stands in Charlotte Amalie in St. Thomas, the calabash shells were sold as purses, masks and bowls with beautiful carvings on the outside.



Duluth Power Squadron Members! HELP! We need your ingenuity and creativity!!! Commanders from all squadrons have been asked to get their teams together to build their own squadron's cardboard dingy (s) to be raced against Duluth and all the other squadrons at the city dock in Bayfield, WI. during the District 10, 2001 Summer Rendezvous July 20-22, 2001.

Prizes include: 1) Most creative design; 2) Best technical design; 3) Most spectacular sinking; 4) Best decorated boat; 5) Best costumes associated with design or theme of boat; and 6) Best speed.

See Gordy & Kelly Olson or Commander Cawcutt for complete set of rules. Some of the rules include: No electric motors, gasoline or diesel engines, or sails may be used. Propulsion must occur from moving water...not contacting the bottom. Only corrugated cardboard many be used. It can be of any thickness but must not be bonded to any material such as vinyl. Non-corrugated material may not be used, especially the kind of resin or wax-type coating found in packaging cases. No solid cardboard and no carpet rolls may be used. Wood, metal or any other materials that would aid in flotation or make the hull more rigid are prohibited. This restriction applies to the keel, transom, ribs, etc. No material such as Styrofoam or rubber inflatable devices may be used to provide buoyancy or maintain flotation. Hulls may not be wrapped in plastic. Hulls may be painted with any "one-part" paint. Joints and seams may be glued or taped. Etc., etc., etc., etc.

Vessel Safety Checks

It's not too soon to think about Vessel Safety Checks!! It's the opportune time to have your vessel looked at by a trained examiner. He or she will check your vessel's lights, horn, bilge pump(s) and PFD's just to name a few. The equipment that's required, as well as recommended, depends on the size and type of vessel you have, so come on over to the dock and get checked out. You may want to become an examiner yourself. All you have to do is pass a test and then examine five vessels while accompanied by a qualified examiner. That's it!! If you're interested, contact our Squadron Safety Officer, Jim Munger. He will get the information to you.

On Saturday, June 2nd, Vessel Safety Checks will be going on at the Squadron Dock. Lots will be going on that day. In addition to VSC's, there will be a Great Lakes tug, a Coast Guard Law Enforcement Vessel, a General Meeting and a steak fry. Watch for flyers coming out in May with more details.

In addition to June 2nd at the Squadron Dock, there will be other locations that Vessel Safety Checks will be done at this summer. Watch for news articles, flyers, radio announcements and "talk around the dock" for where and when.

The Coast Guard in Duluth did more than 300 boardings last year. Less than half of those boarded had had a Vessel Safety Check performed. Now just think of how many boats weren't boarded. Ever wonder how many people are operating boats and don't have a clue as to what's going on? Or what equipment is required or recommended to have on board? Those numbers are a reminder to the members of Duluth Power Squadron, along with Coast Guard Auxiliary, of the need to get the word out expressing the importance of VSC's and the Public Safe Boating Course. Spread the word. Invite someone you know, or don't know, to have a VSC. Encourage someone to take a Public Safe Boating Course. It's up to us to spread the word about safe boating. 




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
