

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Administrative Officer's Report




Another Labor Day Weekend is behind us signaling the rapid end of summer. I hope your season was enjoyable.

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Apostle Islands Wilderness Suitability Study!!!

Channel 16 verses Channel 9

Apostle Islands National Lakeshore is in the process of initiating a wilderness suitability study. A brief assessment made during the development of the park's General Management Plan in 1989 found that more than 97 percent of the land base of Apostle Islands National Lakeshore was potentially suitable for wilderness designation. The wilderness suitability study/EIS will propose which of the park's lands and waters should continue to be managed as a designated wilderness. Only the United States Congress can designate wilderness areas.





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When Invited, Be A Good Guest.

From "On The Water" with the Fort Myers Power Squadron

Being invited to go on a cruise can and should be a very exciting experience for everyone involved. However, being a good guest carries with it certain obligations and responsibilities that you should be aware of.

Have a clear understanding with your host on what you will be doing and where you will be going during the cruise. The amount and type of clothing to bring is dependent on this knowledge. Boats do not have limitless storage space. Wear the proper shoes. For example, do not wear high heels, or black rubber soles that would leave marks on the deck. Leather soles are too slippery to use aboard boats.

Do not ask, "what may I contribute for the cruise?" This strategy may border on getting the captain involved in using his boat for hire which requires a U.S. Coast Guard license. There are tactful means for friends to bring goodies on a cruise without giving the appearance of paying or trading for a cruise. Do not bring glass containers aboard that might easily break. Many items are now available in plastic containers, or you may repackage them at home. On a boat, regardless of its size, sooner or later it will roll or bounce, sending unsecured items scattering about. Bulkheads have been marred by flying cameras, binoculars, bottles, cans, etc. If you are a smoker, ask if smoking is allowed onboard, and whether there are any requirements as to when and where. Obviously, smoking is never allowed while taking on fuel nor immediately thereafter until the boat is well away from the fuel dock and well aired out. Hard sided luggage is a no-no and is not welcome aboard a boat. There is rarely storage space for it, and while maneuvering it around the tight spaces and corners, marring can damage the bulkheads.

Recognize your capabilities aboard and offer to help with chores that you can handle. Many times, sitting out of the way is the best help of all! If you are asked to do something, do not hesitate to ask how or to have the instructions repeated. Also remember that there may be more than one way to do a task, but generally the captain has his own preferred method. The old seaman's method of rolling clothes when packing for a voyage is very practical as clothes seem to require less space and actually become less wrinkled than if folded. When using sunscreen, be mindful of what you touch and where you sit. You don't want to leave grease spots all over the boat to remind your host never to invite you back.

Regardless, one of the most important attributes is the ability to maintain a pleasant attitude in the face of adversity. Keep a cheery disposition, even if it rains. No one likes a grouch. Most people like some quiet time. Bring along some reading material. Boats generally are rather confined spaces and it is true that a boat's living space appears to shrink about one foot per day when out to sea.

Whether planning a transatlantic voyage, or a half day cruise on a small lake, everyone aboard should be familiar with the basic safety equipment and the actions to take in the event of an emergency. For example, be aware of where the fire extinguishers are and how to properly douse a fire that you may confront. Also

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know where the life jackets are located so you will not have to search for them if the need arises.

Above all, using common sense when going aboard someone else's vessel will hopefully make for a pleasant and memorable journey and initiate a return invitation.

Recreational boating can and should be one of life's more rewarding experiences. To gain confidence and to learn how to avoid and/or deal with adverse events on the water, take a safe boating course offered by the Power Squadrons in our area. ...


