

No. 6 Participate in the Cooperative Charting Program earning National Honor Roll Status.

No. 7 Increase our number of Vessel Examiners by 5 and the number of Vessel Exams by 25%.

<u>No. 8</u> Continue to publish a quality bimonthly newsletter and achieve a "Distinction In Journalism Award.

No. 9 Continue to support the USPS Educational Fund by making 100% contribution.

No. 10 Participate in the Star Squadron Program earning "Three Star" status.

Hope to see you all at our Fitting Out Party, April 26th. Tracy has a spectacular event planned.



Executive Officer's Report



Fitting Out Dinner & Auction

The next major event on our Power Squadron calendar is the Fitting Out Dinner and Auction. Here's what you need to know:

What? - Many consider this to be the most fun event of the year. Dinner will be prepared by Power Squadron chefs Jack Soetebier, Bruce Beste, and crew. Dinner will include:

Mixed Green Salad with Mandarin and Almond Dressing Prime Rib

Yukon Gold Potatoes

Firehouse Baked Beans

European Crusty Roll

Jack's Famous Carrot Cake

Coffee You may bring beer, wine, or your favorite cocktail.

How Much? – The cost for the prime rib dinner with all the trimmings is just \$12/person for you and your spouse. Because it is BYOB, you don't even have a bar bill. This is cheaper than staying at home. AND you can invite up to (4) four friends, neighbors, or relatives as your guests for just \$6/person. Here's your chance to take someone out to a prime rib dinner for less than the price of lunch. Now they owe you and have to either take you out for a \$20 dinner or invite you over for a dinner that it takes them 3 hours to prepare. At this price we have to ask that you bring no more than four (4) guests.

Where? - Marshall High School cafeteria

Why? - Mostly because it is FUN! It is also a chance for you to buy things really cheap. This is our major fund raising event of the year. It provides the funding for things like our educational programs, dock lease, dock repairs, squadron insurance, etc.

When? – Saturday, April 26th, we would like to get your auction donations prior to the night of the auction. Just call me 728-7102 for pickup. OR you can bring auction items between 1:00 and 3:00 p.m. on the day of the auction. The party and Silent & Chinese Auctions begin at 4:00 p.m., dinner at 6:00 p.m., live auction at 7:30 p.m.

What to wear? — This is a boating party, so dress like a boater! This gives you lots of latitude. If you own a yacht, a blue blazer with ascot and white slacks would be perfect. If you are like me and spend more time in the engine room than you do on deck, jeans and a t-shirt would be best. The ten best dressed people will get to be first in the food line. The worst dressed person will get a \$25 gift certificate from Mainstreet Clothiers.

What do I need to bring? – Please bring something of value that can either be raffled or auctioned off. Did you know that your donation is tax deductible? The Power Squadron is a 501 (c)3 corporation, therefore, you can deduct the value of your donation as a charitable contribution. Often the value of your donation is more than you would get if you sold the item. Here are some suggestions of items that would make good donations.

Personal Services - What can you do that others would value? Such as tree removal, a weekend at your cabin, professional services, snow plowing, a ride in a '57 Chevy Convertible, or ???

Something from Your Employer – Some ideas are gift certificates, products that they want to promote, a slow moving product, or ??? These should be a real donation and not a discount or "buy one get one free" type of offer.


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Ramblings of an Old Salt.

The Duluth Power Squadron, through a USPS Adopt-a-Chart Coop-Charting Program has had many members submitting changes that are now reflected in the updated Duluth Harbor Chart.

The Apostle Island Chart has the updated inserts of the dock layout for Pikes Bay Marina as one of the many changes.

Here's a short story based on the importance in having the most recent updated chart. You are cruising from Duluth to Bayfield and decided you will spend the night at Port Superior Marina because you enjoyed it three years ago when you were last in the area.

The wind is still blowing strong, it's getting dark and you and your crew are getting tired of being on the water all day. You pass Bayfield and are making your approach to Port Superior, so you take a closer look at the Apostle Island chart you used last time. It is still in good condition. Comparing the chart to your radar screen, something is different.

They don't match. The old railroad boxcars that used to be part of the break wall and used to show up so clearly on your radar, aren't showing up like they used to.

You slow down, put the wife on the bow for a lookout and proceed with caution, spot lights blaring.

After fifteen tense minutes you see the entrance to the NEW break wall and have figured that Port Superior must have expanded. You're tired, it's late, the weather is bad and you and your crew are stressed out. All you want to do is find the first open dock and settle in for the night. After a much needed and good nights rest you head over to Port Superior's Office. Start recruiting your little ones now. There will be judging at the Squadron, District and National levels. Prizes will be awarded.





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

Safety Officer's Report by Jim Munger.



Fast Facts for Minnesota on the new Federal Requirement for Children to Wear Life Jackets

(prepared by the Minnesota Department of Natural Resources—Boat & Water Safety Section)

New Federal Requirements:

Safety Officer, Doc Munger

Effective December 23, 2002, U.S. Coast Guard regulations require children <u>under 13 years of age</u> to wear an appropriate USCG approved personal flotation device (PFD or life jacket) on recreational vessels, if the vessel is underway and the child is not below decks or in an enclosed cabin.

Here is more background on this new regulation:

- This is a <u>federal</u>, not a state requirement and may be enforced only by agencies such as the U.S. Coast Guard or the National Park Service. It cannot be enforced by MN DNR conservation officers, or county sheriff's deputies.
- It is effective only on lakes and rivers subject to the jurisdiction of the United States. Some examples would be: Lake Superior, Lake Winnibigoshish, Leech & Cass Lakes, the Gull & Whitefish Lake Chains, portions of the Minnesota, Mississippi, St. Croix & St. Louis Rivers, Big Stone & Traverse Lakes, Lake of the Woods, Rainy, Namakan and Kabetogama Lakes, as well as most other lakes and rivers on the Canadian-Minnesota Border.

Minnesota does <u>not</u> have a similar law covering all boats:

• Although Minnesota does not have a similar requirement for kids to wear life jackets aboard all craft, surveys conducted at Metro area public accesses by the MN DNR in 1984 and again in 1996, showed a huge increase in the percentage of boaters of all ages wearing PFDs—especially children. In 1984, 47% of children under 12 were observed to be wearing life vests—by 1996 that number had grown to 88%. A 2001 study of five counties in Central Minnesota also showed an 88% wear rate amongst this age group.

- The high percentage of children voluntarily wearing PFDs in Minnesota is reflected in boat accident statistics. In the 10 years from 1993 through 2002, there were two fatal boat accidents in which a child less than 13 was killed. In both accidents, trauma was the cause of death, neither victim left the craft and both victims were wearing a life jacket.
- Current Minnesota law <u>does</u> require <u>all</u> persons who operate or ride personal watercraft (PWC, Jet Skis, Sea Doos, etc.) to wear a life jacket.
- The DNR continues to strongly urge all boat occupants—adults, teenagers and children, especially in craft less than 20 feet long, to wear a life jacket at all times on the water. The Coast Guard estimates that 80 percent of boating deaths in the country (which are primarily a result of falls overboard & capsizing) could be eliminated if all boaters wore a life jacket.



FOURTH SEGMENT OF OUR TRIP

July 18th

We planned to depart St. Ignace in the early morning hours however the wind and the waves were not inviting. With the weather forecast predicting the same conditions for the next day, we decided to lay-over another day. We caught up on some reading and worked on boat maintenance and other pertinent items. We also spent some time exploring the town of St. Ignace and it's shops.

July 19th

We left St. Ignace at 5:30 am in a light mist but otherwise fine boating weather.

Going under the Mackinaw Bridge is a tremendous and awe inspiring experience. Our intended destination was Charlevoix Harbor. However, they had a festival starting the next day so no transient slips were available. We turned instead to Little Traverse Bay and the harbor of Petoskey. When we arrived we were surprised to find *The Lazy Sea Dog*, Bud and Rosemary Flynn, were also in harbor there. We spent three great days exploring all the neat places in the area, with the Flynn's as our tour guide. They had boated this area several years in a row and were very familiar with it's points of interest. We went to Harbor Springs, which is across the bay from Petoskey. The town is quite lovely and has a large

marina. In the marina we saw a number of huge boats at the "exorbitant" end of the price scale. Many of the boats were over 100' and included several Hatteras', Azumuthuss', Vikings and Fead Ships. We also went to Bay View, a very exclusive community, hosting, or as Tom says, "boasting", a new marina. The slips alone go for \$250,000-\$300,000.

July 21st

We departed early morning on our next leg on the way to Manitowoc. Our day's destination was the town of Leland, Michigan. The journey began a bit rough with

3 to 4 foot high waves. The last hour and ½ of our days' trip was a much quieter ride as the wind and waves settled down. Leland is a wonderful little town with a 60 slip marina. They have converted their old fishing village into incredible shops, clothing and treasures as well as ice cream stores and restaurants. It's like shopping in a village of boutiques. We found a restaurant adjacent to a dam, with a beautiful waterfall. The deck is built right over the water. You can even feel the mist from the water spilling through the dam. We decided to hold up in this picturesque town due in part to high waves (and because Julie wanted to explore the shops). That evening a 146' Feadship came into the harbor for overnight dockage. This privately owned vessel had eight full time crew members dressed in uniform whites. They all had white captains dress hats and white gloves. This seemed a bit out of place as the four, male crewmembers, fueled the boat and pumped the head. The vessel also had two "dinghys" One was a 26' cutty with twin I/O's the other was an amphibious car with twin props. It sure would be the way to get around town. Drive the vehicle as a boat up to the launch ramp then switch to the tires in car mode and drive to the restaurants or whatever.

July 23rd

We departed Leland with our first stop in Frankford, for fuel. We found a really neat little town but will have to wait til next time to explore it in depth. After fueling up we continued our trip to Manitowoc. This turned out to be a 120-mile trek across Lake Michigan. We had a decent day for crossing but in the last forty miles the wind picked up and our ride got a bit bouncy. We arrived at 2:45 with a time zone change and settled in at the marina for four days of fun at the District 10 rendezvous.

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S.H.I.T.

In the 16th and 17th centuries, before commercial fertilizer was invented, large amounts of manure were transported by ship. It was transported dry because it weighed a lot less this way than when wet.

But once water hit it at sea, it not only became heavier, the process of fermentation began, a byproduct of which is methane gas. It didn't take long for the methane to build up below decks, and the first time someone came below at night with a lantern, BOOOM! Several ships were destroyed in this manner before somebody figured out what was happening.



Once they determined the role that manure played in the explosions, everybody began stamping the bundles with the term **SHIP HIGH IN TRANSIT**. This was so sailors would know to stow it high enough off the lower decks so that any water that came into the hold would not touch this volatile cargo and start the production of methane. Thus evolved the term S.H.I.T., which has come down through the centuries and is in use to this very day.

You probably did not know the history of this word. Neither did I. I always thought it was a golf term.


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Nobody Knows It But Me
