

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Ramblings of an Old Salt.



Senior Education Officer's Report:

Greetings!

By the time you read this, another off-boating season of classes will have been completed. We had a total of 45 students enrolled in the two Squadron Boating Courses, 14 in Engine Maintenance, and 14 in Seamanship. If there

seems to be enough interest during the vessel safety checks in June, I may schedule a Boat Smart course mid summer. This is the abbreviated two day course that omits the chapters on compass, charting, and piloting, but upon completion entitles the student to membership in the squadron. Those topics would then be covered later in advanced grade courses. Another suggestion was to offer the first Squadron Boating Course [SBC] in the fall while boating is still fresh in people's minds, rather than the traditional January start. This would be followed by an additional SBC mid winter and Seamanship in the spring. It is also another year for Piloting and Advanced Piloting for those who have mastered Seamanship. Dave Anderson, our own honorary member and local meteorologist, is willing to do another Weather course with help from the National Weather Service. This is one of our more challenging courses and has been revised with two new text books this year. Any additional electives would depend upon interest expressed so let me know if there is anything specific you'd like to see.

I wish every squadron member would try to take at least one course every year. After all, it is through education, as well as experience, that we become safer and more responsible boaters.


The Duluth Boat Club Then and Now.

THE DULUTH BOAT CLUB THEN AND NOW



Water droplets glisten in the early morning sun as rower's practice in the harbor. White sails and whitecaps shine in the bright afternoon as a pram regatta rounds a mark. Adventure for young and old, participants and observers. The Duluth Boat Club then and now.

At the turn of the last century, The Duluth Boat Club was the hub of aquatic recreation in the city. Many yacht clubs across the country are modeled after Duluth's old club. With a membership of 1400, it was also a social center for dances weddings and harbor events. It declined with time and was disbanded in the late 1920's. Rowers revived the name in 1956, then in 1978 called their organization the Duluth Rowing Club to more correctly represent their activities.

A few years ago a grass roots effort to revive the Duluth Boat Club was started by individuals from several boating organizations. The idea was to include all water sports and boating organizations to share in a facility.

From the start the Duluth Power Squadron supported the Duluth Boat Club concept. While we haven't seen direct involvement in the facility as good for DPS, we have

maintained a loose affiliation with the Duluth Boat Club. With mutual goals of safety on the water we can see opportunities to conduct classes for people we might not reach otherwise.

So what's happening with the Duluth Boat Club? The facility is to be built on Park Point, on the bay, between 14th and 16th streets. State, Federal and local governments owned this land, so acquisition took a while. The city will own the facility and lease it to the Duluth Boat Club, but the construction expenses will have to be covered by grants and donations. Last summer the 367th Engineering Battalion of the Army Reserve cleared debris from the beach and prepared the site for construction. Bill Kanuit of Lakehead Oil donated their fuel. The Duluth Rotary Club 25 donated \$25,000 in matching funds for the construction of the first building. Donations are close to matching at this time. Architect Jon Helstrom has designed the buildings, and worked with the State of Minnesota, the DNR and the city to define the site and lay out the boat ramp. This summer the DNR plans to build that ramp. Volunteers will be assisting the construction of the Rotary 25 building this summer. Materials are being offered at cost from Hermantown Lumber and Baumgarten & Sons. The property lease with the City of Duluth was approved at the City Council meeting Feb. 24th. Currently the Duluth Boat Club is acquiring a crane to launch & retrieve smaller keelboats for international regattas. Eventually there will be some kind of breakwall and docks.

Even without a facility, programs have been underway. The most visible was the use of the Duluth Boat Club to handle the logistics of the Dragon Boat race last summer. Boat building, canoe and kayak races are others. Youth programs are an important focus.

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



floating island of ice.

The second reason? When it's NOT boating season, I think we all love it when the wind blows. When the wind is out of the west and there's ice, it gets blown to the northeastern side of Lake Superior and our view is of the dazzling, deep blue waters. However, if the wind blows from the northeast for a few days, as it did last week with winds as high as 58 mph, all of the ice from the entire lake gets blown into our western corner and the huge ice chunks pile up higher and higher. This is the most fun to watch. Some of these piles reach 20 feet or more...which is amazing when you realize that ice is also pushed another 20 feet below the water. Because Duluth is the largest of the Great Lakes ports (we generally have around 40 million metric tons of cargo pass through the port each year), it's not unusual to have one of the big commercial boats caught in this mass of ice. Last week, two commercial boats, the Canadian Progress and the Canadian Olympic, were stuck.

Isn't this time of year just a great time to look out your

window and watch the many views of Lake Superior?

It's mid-April 2003, spring is definitely in the air and we boaters are thinking about splashing our boats. But that doesn't mean Lake Superior is ready for spring! Duluth Power Squadron members know that the largest lake in the world frequently has no ice all winter long until the end of March draws near. That's when you'll often see ice forming and it's a time when watching Lake Superior gets really fun. I think it's fun for two reasons:

The first reason is that some people can't resist fishing on the ice. For days, you'll see people out there drilling holes in the lake and trying to catch lake trout. Then the wind will change direction and it's not unusual for a fisherman or two plus their equipment to get blown out into the middle of the lake. The Duluth office of the U.S. Coast Guard then gets a call and has to rescue the people from a







PART V -- FINAL LEG OF OUR SIX WEEK TRIP IN THE NORTH CHANNEL & DISTRICT 10 RENDEZVOUS

SUNDAY JULY 28TH

We departed Manitowoc at 5:00am bound for Leland, Michigan, the first leg of our trip home. We started out with light fog and a beam sea. By 6 am the fog lifted and the seas subsided to small following rollers. The trip went very quickly and it was enjoyable to be on the water for another day. We spent the night in Leland, one of our very favorite spots on the trip. There were a number of very large boats in port that evening. After we had settled in, a 124' Feadship pulled in just across from our slip. The vessel was very impressive and had a full time crew of eight all dressed in nautical whites including white gloves. The vessel also had two dinghies on the top deck, with power davits. The first one was a 24' cutty with twin IO's. The second was an amphibious car with twin engine. We had an enjoyable dinner followed by our "mandatory" stop at the ice cream place.

MONDAY JULY 29th

We departed at 5:30 with a hint of rain in the air. The forecast indicated some weather would be passing to the South of us. Our first two hours were fine, but then the breeze freshened and the waves quickly built to five foot with a quartering sea. We got some light rain and it seemed to clear. As we made the turn towards the Mackinaw Bridge, the seas calmed and a glimpse of the sun seemed to indicate a change in the weather. Within ten miles the dark storm clouds from the Southwest closed in behind us. What followed were torrential winds followed by numerous lighting strikes. We shortened our day's trip and tucked into St. Ignace Harbor to wait out the storm. It took until the following day for the storm to blow itself out.

TUESDAY JULY 30TH

We departed at 0600 bound for the St. Mary's River and the Sioux. The St. Mary's River and canal are extremely beautiful with a large number of buoys to signal the way. The entire area reminded us of Voyagers National Park in Minnesota. We passed several large freighters that actually came within fifty feet of us in these narrow channels.

With no room to maneuver, it can get very exciting and nerve wracking. Fortunately, the ships were going slow and there was very little other traffic in the channel. We spent a great evening at Jack Kemp Marina sharing a cook out and beautiful sunset in the Sioux and later caught up on our laundry, e-mails and boat maintenance.

WEDNESDAY JULY 31ST

Rising nearly, we were ready to go at 5:00 am. We called the U.S. locks on Channel 14. They had no one in the locks so they were able to bring us in right away. The people working the locks told us that they are seldom busy at that time of the morning. With light winds and beautiful sunshine our cruising proved be spectacular. We planned to go all the way to Houghton-Hancock; however, a Coast Guard bulletin for bad weather sent us into Grand Marais, Michigan.

THURSDAY AUGUST 1ST

The main storm hit early in the morning with seventy mile per hour wind gusts and torrential rains. The storm was accompanied by a tremendous seiche. This occurs when you have a very high pressure system on one end of the Lake and a very low pressure system on the other end of the Lake. When this effect is accompanied by high winds it creates a kind of bathtub effect. Normally this effect will cause a rise and fall on Lake Superior of 6" to 12" which we have observed before. However in this case the conditions were perfect to create a rise and fall of seven (7') in a period of twenty minutes. At one extreme the water was spilling over the top of the retaining wall and twenty minutes later at the other extreme our boat props were touching the bottom. Two of the local 10 year old kids came by on their bikes. One of them rode his bike down the launch ramp to the waters edge. Having never seen the water that low he left his bike and ran to tell his buddy. When the two returned a little while later, they found the water spilling over the top of the launch ramp and the bike owner was very upset that someone had taken his bike. I told them to just wait a few minutes and they would see the bike reappear. They could hardly believe their eyes. We know that one foot of water on Lake Superior equals 6.82 trillion gallons. This means that in a twenty-minute period of time nearly 50 trillion gallons of water was moving without a single sound or any visible movement of water. The morale of course is "to never mess with Mother Nature" nor Lake Superior.




