- The Twin Ports is located 2,342 miles (less than a week's sailing time) from the Atlantic Ocean.
- Lake Superior has 31,700 square miles of earth's freshest water.
- The Twin Ports' waterfront is 49 miles long with 17 miles of dredged channels.

- 1,100 vessels enter the twin ports annually.


Coastal Cleanup Day in Florida.

COASTAL CLEANUP DAY in the Ft. Myers/Cape Coral, Florida area is an annual and in some areas semi-annual event. They also have a MONOFILAMENT MADNESS weekend where hundreds of pounds of discarded mono line is collected. Florida also has the Adopt A Roadway program similar to Minnesota. Bottom line, cleaning up after people!

Here is why it is necessary to have these organized unpleasant events. On a Saturday in September, 458 volunteers scoured a portion of the 21 mile area of accessible shoreline. By noon they had collected 3,664 pounds of garbage. As you can imagine, nearly "everything under the sun" was discarded by someone. A seventh grader was quoted "That was nasty. Good thing we were cleaning today so no one else would find that".


Fall District 10 Meeting Held in Duluth, October 31-November 2.



Safety Officer's Report.

 Duluth Squadron Vessel Examiners performed 159 examinations in 2003. Number of VSC Decals issued, 141. Failure to receive a decal was due to missing or outdated flares, missing or out of date documentation or registration. In one situation the backfire flame arrestor was missing. PFDs factored in at least one failure. Increased safety awareness of the Skippers involved could save lives!

In 2004 Squadron members can continue to promote safer recreational boating by becoming Vessel Examiners. We plan training and refresher courses for Vessel Examiners to begin the 2004 boating season.

2. According to an item in Boat US, quoted in the "Beacon" published by the

USCGuard Auxiliary Association:

"Boat US has learned that some of the plastic flare guns made by Olih (now Orion) can't be opened wide enough to accept a flare cartridge and would be useless in an emergency. Ted Swanson, a marine surveyor in Florida, regularly checks flare guns while doing surveys and found that 13% of the Olin guns (9 out of 69) he has inspected can't be fully opened.


A spokesman at Orion Safety Products confirmed the problem; nylon material used to keep the breech closed can deform and jam the opening mechanism. Any Olin plastic flare gun is suspect, as are Orion guns made before 2000, the year the mechanism was reengineered (guns with the modification have the USCG approval code 160

028/12/1 stamped on the body). A recall has not been issued, although Orion has agreed to replace any of the defective guns, regardless of age. Orion recommends checking the operation of the guns now and at the beginning of every season; if the breech won't open, the gun should be sent back for replacement."

Note: as Squadron Safety Officer, I have repeatedly in boating classes, urged boaters to refer to a "Flare launcher" rather than a "flare gun." To use the term "gun" raises "eyebrows" of border agents in US and Canada!



The Power of One. (A Message From National.)

We are pleased to introduce a new USPS®-wide initiative aimed at accelerating membership growth through a two-pronged approach. The Power of One campaign consists of elements that taken together will enable squadrons to dramatically increase new recruitments, while concurrently addressing the need to involve and retain their existing members. This initiative is intended to be a process that focuses on encouraging individual members within Squadrons to take the leadership role in the recruitment and retention process. Local squadrons and districts are free to plan and implement any appropriate membership recruitment and retention programs of their choosing.

In 1976, USPS had over 80,000 members; however, during the subsequent 15year period, USPS membership has fallen off to less than 60,000. To significantly and successfully address the USPS membership growth issue, individual USPS members must be engaged in the process. Recruitment and involvement/retention are fundamentally about interpersonal relationships. As noted in the recent "Power of One" speeches, it is not national, district, or squadron committees striving to create incentive campaigns or innovative programs that make the difference, it is the dedication and determination of individual members that makes the system work. Clearly, the old adage that 'member involvement is everyone's iob" continues to be true. The Power of One Campaign seeks to address the membership issue by focusing on a USPS-wide membership drive centering on individual members that is organized and coordinated by individual Squadrons. This bottomup membership driven process has a great chance of succeeding because it engages all USPS members in the solution.

Squadron Recognition through Individual Member Achievements

The goal of this program component is to recognize and reward Squadrons through the achievement of individual members within their ranks. Recognition levels are as follows:

- -All USPS members who recruit at least one new member or reinstate a previous member,
- -Those individuals who achieve distinction by reaching the five and ten new member recruitment levels, and
- -The 25 USPS Members who recruit at least fifteen new members into USPS. (Everyone reaching the' 15th new members recruited level would be automatically entered in a drawing for the 25 award slots.)

The USPS recruiter will receive award recognition and reward as follows:

- --1st new member Power of One - **lapel pin**
- --5th new member Power of One - **hat**
- --10th new member Power of One - "Captain's Club jacket w/ Power of One" logo
- --15th new member Power of One - "Admiral's Club jacket w/ Power of One" logo plus be entered into a drawing to receive special national recognition and an expenses reimbursed trip to the USPS 2005 Annual Meeting in Orlando, FI including:
- ---presentation of a "Power of One" Admiral's Club jacket by C/C during the GovBd
- ---an invitation to attend a C/C's reception as a USPS VIP
- ---expense reimbursed trip to the USPS 2005 Annual Meeting in Orlando, FI would include an allocation up to the following amounts for airfare (\$250), hotel (\$250), Saturday noon Member's Luncheon (\$35), and the Saturday evening Dinner Dance (\$50) totaling \$585.00 in travel support.

All USPS Members reaching Power of One "Admiral's Club" or "Captain's Club" recognition level of achievement will receive a special Certificate acknowledging their "Admiral's Club" or "Captain's Club" award status in addition to having their names engraved on an honorary plaque that will be placed on display at USPS HQ. The first round of individual level recognition and reward will be presented at the USPS 2005 Annual Meeting in Orlando,

Assignment of credit The determination of who would be assigned the credit for new member re-

cruits, including reinstatements, i.e. the member on the dock that introduced a new member to the public boating class, the public boating course chairman who taught the class, or the Squadron membership chairman who worked to recruit the potential member into USPS has been the single most discussed topic involving this program. Interestingly, the solution was simple and came from the suggestion of a member who attended the Squadron Officers and General Members meeting at the New Orleans GovBd. The suggestion was, rather than USPS members hagaling over who should receive credit for their joining, modify the USPS Membership Application form blank referencing the endorsing Squadron member to read, "Which USPS member most influenced you to join the United States Power Squadrons?" In this way, the new recruit will specify who will be assigned credit for their membership. This represents a simple, yet eloquent, solution.
