Learn to Cope with Boating Emergencies

CAPSIZING

Most boaters and outdoor sportsmen love water, including swimming, waterskiing and fishing. However, some people have a fear of water. Before you cast off in a boat you should find a life jacket and put it on to make sure it fits you properly. If you are a non swimmer, wear it at all times. Whenever water conditions or weather cause concern, have everybody aboard immediately put on their life jacket.

The marine environment is unforgiving. What may initially be a minor problem can rapidly develop into a situation beyond your control. Most boating fatalities are not weather related. Fatalities typically occur in open vessels on inland waters in the afternoon when the weather and visibility are good, the winds and water light to calm.

Capsizing and falling overboard are the leading causes of boating fatalities. To reduce the risk of capsizing or swamping, follow these rules: don't overload your vessel, turn your vessel at controlled speeds and if anchoring, secure the anchor line to the bow of the vessel, never to the stern. If you should capsize, or swamp your vessel, stay with the vessel. If the vessel remains afloat, try to climb onto the overturned vessel.

It is important to get as much of your body as possible out of cold water. Exposure to cold causes loss of body heat. Hypothermia is defined as a core or internal body temperature of less than 95 degrees. Hypothermia can kill. Even in water temperatures of 80 degrees, your core temperature will rapidly drop causing you to become lethargic, dizzy and sleepy.

A BOAT FIRE

Fire is the most feared thing that can happen to you while you are in a boat on the water. If the fire erupts while your vessel is under way, follow these steps: stop the vessel and have everyone who is not wearing a life jacket put one on. Keep the fire downwind. If the fire is at the back of the vessel, head the vessel into the wind. If the engine must be shut off, use a paddle to keep the bow into the wind.


If the fire is forward, put the stern into the wind. If the motor catches fire, immediately shut off the fuel supply. Remember the P.A.S.S. word, an acronym for the four basic steps to using a fire extinguisher. Pull the safety pin by grabbing the ring and twisting. Aim the hose at the base of the fire. Squeeze the handle. Sweep the hose from side to side while discharging. Never use water on a gasoline, oil, grease or electrical fire. Water will spread a gas fire and will act as a conductor for electricity.

Summon help with your VHF radio. Providing you had enough time to make an SOS Mayday call, help may be on the way. Nearby boats may have heard your mayday call and be on the water to render assistance. If you have to abandon ship, jump into the water, swim as far away from the fire as possible. There is danger of burning fuel on the surface of the water around the burning vessel and also the chance of a large explosion from the fuel tanks aboard.

Be prepared for these emergencies, do practice drills aboard your vessel. It may save lives one day.




The Sunday News Tribune was delivered to over 40 back decks and RV doorsteps, and was a great treat for all in attendance.

Trans Superior Recap

Keith Stauber is the owner, and skipper of the J35, "Papa Gaucho" that won the 20th running of the Trans-Superior Race, some 387 statute miles from Sault Ste Marie MI to Duluth MN.

The race started at noon, Saturday, Aug 4, 2007 at the bottom of Whitefish bay, and Papa Gaucho finished at 8PM, Monday evening some 56 hours later, averaging almost 7 miles an hour across the lake. This was one of the fastest races on record.

Of the 9 crew members aboard, the Duluth sailors included Keith Stauber, Bob Boynton, Murray George, Andy George, and Chris Juntinen.


The boat sailed fast out of Whitefish bay close hauled in a building NE wind. Rounding the corner of Whitefish Point the wind clocked to the south during Saturday night into Sunday and they sailed a fast close spinnaker reach to Copper Harbor, catching 3 of their class boats as they all ran into light wind.

Rounding and leaving the Keewanaw Peninsula Sunday evening the wind stayed south but picked up to 20 knots true, on the nose. The Duluth boat sailed close hauled on a south westerly course, pounding to weather into 6 to 8 foot seas with 25 knots of wind across the deck all night, sailing 7 knots to weather, flying a new #1, large heavy headsail. It

was not a particularly cold night, but the few seas that swept the deck were indeed cold. Good foul weather gear, life jackets, and secured safety lines were the order of the night. Throughout the night the crew weight was kept to the high side, they sailed a fast and straight course and put most of the competition behind them.

By Monday morning/afternoon midway between Silver Bay, and Outer Island the wind lightened and backed to a NE. "Papa Gaucho" had the two 50 footers ahead on the north shore, and a 38 footer, the only other boat ahead, off their port bow on the south shore. Much to the crew's delight the notorious NE build to 20+ knots throughout Monday afternoon and evening, and "Papa" finished within 4 hours and 2 hours respectively behind the two fifty footers, however each had to give "Papa" over 6 hours in corrected time, or beat "Papa" by over 6 hours. The 38 finished 30 minutes ahead, but had to give "Papa over 1 hour in corrected time. Stauber and crew did some fast surfing to the finish off the Duluth piers in this building NE to win the Trans-Superior overall, as well as the coveted Baghley trophy which is presented to the first Duluth boat to win.

Jack Soetebier, and Dr. John Pierpont who are credited with establishing the first Trans-Superior race in 1969 were also honored at the banquet the following Thursday.






Pierpont-Soetebier Youth Sailing Fund Established







Kathleen's Carmel Corn

Pop 2 cups of popcorn kernels. Set popped corn aside in buttered bowls or pans. In a large heavy saucepan, mix together:

- 1 cup butter (no substitutes)
- 2 cups dark brown sugar
- 1/2 cup light brown corn syrup
- 2 tsp. dark molasses
- 1 tsp. salt

Cook, stirring constantly, to 270°—290°, or Soft Crack Stage. Test in cold water. Remove from heat and stir in 2 tsp. Maplegine flavoring and 1/2 tsp. baking soda. Drizzle over popped corn and stir to coat. Enjoy!




