"How does your boat handle and perform? Nobody knows better than you do, if you know how fast it travels at various engine/propeller speeds under different conditions. Predicted log contests pit your knowledge and skippering skills against the clock. How closely can you pre-determine the time it will take to travel each leg of a course? Competing against yourself and comparing your skills to those of other boaters, this fun competition hones your boat-handling skills."...from the USPS website. 
#### Captain's Log

#### September 3, 2007

It is Monday, Labor day 2007. After leaving the Squadron dock after the Corn Roast, it is time to get ready for my yearly trip to the Apostles Islands. I have done the necessary preparations. Fuel, water, waste, and food are all taken care of. The boat is loaded and ready for another great trip. The weather over the last few days has been great. Mid to upper 70's, light wind. The forecast is calling for 15-20 knot N.E. winds this afternoon, so we better get moving. I met my passenger, Don at Harbor Cove along with the other boat on this trip. Jeff, Larry, and Tony are ready to go. We feel the N.E. wind picking up now and we haven't left the dock. "Let's go!" I listened to the forecast for tomorrow and they are calling for 25-30 knots N.E. "If we don't go today, we will never get a chance to leave." We departed through the Duluth Entry at 1600 hours. The waves in the canal were breaking over the bow. We proceeded out the piers onto the lake. After a brief discussion with the other boat, Captain Jeff and I decided to go out 5 miles or so and see if it was any better. After an hour, we made it 5 miles out. "I am managing, if you guys are ok, let's keep going." Every wave broke over the bow. The green water would rush up the deck and windshield. Water was coming into the cockpit through every zipper and seam. This was getting worse. Larry radioed to Port Wing Marina to check dock status. Our destination was Siskiwit Bay Marina in Cornucopia, but that might have to wait. "Port Wing has room, what do you think?" "Let's keep going, we made it this far." The radio went silent. I kept the nose into the waves and we pressed on to Corny. Bark Point is now in sight. Jeff has already made the corner into Bark Bay and we are about a mile out. As we round the corner, we pick up some protection from

land and the boat is, for the first time on the trip, trimmed out. There are very little waves and hardly any wind. "Great!" I do another spot check of my instruments and notice the fuel consumption has been substantial. I no sooner mentioned it to Don, and vroom, the engine stalls. "Yup, we are out of gas." We are only about 2 miles from the Marina. I laugh as I go to the swim platform and untie the (2) gas cans from the deck. "This would have been a challenge 5 miles ago." The Bay was very calm. I put in the 10 gallons and we were on are way. After tying up safely at the dock, I looked into the cabin. Anything that was on the shelves was now on the floor. Beverage cans hissing out their contents, bags of chips broke open, the refrigerator was emptied onto the floor, it was a mess. The trip from Duluth to Corny took 5 hours plus 2 for clean-up. Moral of the story, 1/3 tank of fuel to get out, 1/3 tank to get back, and 1/3 for the East Winds of Lake Superior.....

#### Don't Miss The Boats







Who invented the Life Preserver? Did you say Stearns or Mustang? No way! It was Leonardo Da Vinci! According to the Da Vinci Experience and the Museum of Leonardo Da Vinci of Florence, Italy, Da Vinci's concept was a life ring that was made of waterproof leather and could be filled with air to increase its volume and buoyancy. "Da Vinci's idea for preserving life at sea is as valid today as it was in Italy in the 15th century." In this, the 21st

century, we have a wide range of life preservers (personal flotation devices) to choose from, including the life ring, a throw-able device.

As we well know, no life preserver can save a life unless it is worn. Once again, in a continuing effort to urge recreational boaters to "Wear It!", the coast Guard and the Coast Guard Auxiliary join hands with the National Safe Boating Council and other marine organizations in a year-round boating safety campaign. The National Safe Boating Council produces the campaign, which is funded in part from the Sport Fish Restoration and Boating Trust Fund. The coast Guard and Auxiliary ask all boat owners and operators to help reduce boating fatalities by wearing a life jacket out on the water.

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#### **Make Sure First Mate is First-Rate**

Is your first mate capable of handling your boat if you become incapacitated? The first mate needs to know how to start the engines, how to operate a VHF radio, where the life jackets are, where the fire extinguishers are and how to use them, which switches turn on the running lights, horn, bilge pumps, etc.

The first mate should know how to anchor the boat and how to raise anchor. They should be knowledgeable in knot tying, line handling, using a boathook, fenders, navigation and what to do in an emergency situation.

Children should not be overlooked either. They can be taught proper use of radio procedures, how to start the engines and

engage in gear, basic first aid techniques, and any other procedures to handle an emergency situation should the captain become incapacitated.

Take advantage of safe boating courses for the entire crew by enrolling in the education courses offered by the Duluth Power Squadron.


