



Boaters should know rules, regulations.....

P/D/C Harvey A. Hengel, SN

- Fog: Proceed at slow speed. One prolonged blast of your horn every two minutes.
 Radar, if you have it, can see through fog.
- Running lights: The law requires them. Must have on from dusk to dawn, in fog or heavy rain or limited visibility.
- Meeting another boat: The boat on the right has the right-of-way.
- Passing another boat: Pass on his starboard, or your port. Sound your horn once for passing on his starboard. If passing on his port, give two blasts of your horn. If he returns five quick blasts on his horn, do not pass.
- Man Overboard: Mark man overboard on GPS if you have one. Raise alarm by shouting "Man Overboard". If there are others on board, instruct a crew member to watch the person in the water and point continuously to him. Immediately throw a life ring and attachment overboard. Ensure the propeller is not turning when you are alongside the person n the water. If you can see the person in the water clearly, a simple 180 degree turn is the quickest. If you cannot see the person, send a mayday call on your VHF radio.
- Mayday call. Call Placed on Channel 16 when in danger of sinking or when life is threatened.
- High wind, rain: Everyone don a personal flotation device(PFD), station a lookout forward, reduce speed and attempt to get to shelter.
- Anchor light: When at anchor, it needs to be on from dusk to dawn and be visible in a 360 degree circle.
- Backing out or leaving dock: One long blast on horn for 2 or 3 seconds.
- Pan-Pan call: Not life threatening, i.e. log floating in area. Use Channel 16 and give location.
- The American flag: It should be flown on the stern or the mast. The flag should be flown from sun up to sun down. It may be flown at night, but only when entering or leaving port.
- When do you fly your flag at half mast? Only at the direction of the President of the U.S. or a state governor.
- SOS: It means Save our Ship. When sent by light, it is three quick flashes followed by three long flashes followed by 3 quick flashes. On the radio it sounds like, dit, dit, da, da, da, dit, dit, dit.

a boating course offered by the Duluth Sail and Power Squadron.



When you see Del at your next Squadron event, please thank her for contributing her time and talents to the Duluth Sail and Power Squadron.



Vintage Channel Chatter—1971

Jim Bujold had the best poker hand and won first prize, with the three other winners also receiving prizes. A good time was had by all.



Chicken with Capers

1 lb. boneless skinless chicken breasts

salt and pepper

1/4 cup flour

2 Tbsp. butter

1 Tbsp. olive oil

1/2 cup chicken broth

2 Tbsp. rinsed & chopped capers

1 Tbsp. lemon juice

1 Tbsp. chopped parsley

Place the chicken between two pieces of plastic wrap. Pound with meat mallet to 1/4 inch thickness. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Dredge the chicken in flour, shake off excess. Melt 1 Tbsp. butter with the olive oil in skillet. Brown two chicken breasts at a time until no longer pink in center. Transfer to a platter and keep warm, repeat with remaining chicken. Add chicken broth to pan, cook until slightly thickened. Add capers, lemon juice, remaining butter, and parsley, pour sauce over chicken.


