

Greetings

I have had exposure to all three sides of the USPS Triangle, initially, in Minnetonka, as Entertainment Chair, Admin Officer and Executive Officer. I really found to my passion in participating in Education, first as a student and then as an Instructor. As you will find out over this watch year, I prefer to get as many members involved so no single individual gets buried in the tasks of Squadron Business.

I've been spending most of my time lately evaluating the Duluth Education Department. I am truly appreciative of the effort and progress Kay Bakke put into this department along with all Instructors and Chairs. The Duluth Education department has grown under Kay's guidance.

So, what's new? I sent out a survey to the membership in an attempt to find out, how can the Squadron Education Department best meet your needs? There is no good or bad, right or wrong on this survey. It will be totally anonymous. I have only 2 requests, first – fill out the survey. Second – be honest in your responses. Remember, this is your squadron. This department needs your input to be successful.

This year, self study-classroom-webinar classes are going to be offered. Time or lack of it, seems to be one of the greatest factors limiting class participation. Here are some interesting facts – 71 members have never passed a course beyond the Boating Course, 8 members have passed Piloting but not Seamanship this is out of 240 active members. How many people knew there is no

longer a prerequisite to take an advanced course or that you do not have to be a member to take any course offered by USPS? Seminars, Electives and Advanced courses will be offered so a student can self study, attend a Saturday course for more chal-

lenging chapters and have a Webinar to assist with material understanding with a proctored test. Being able to take the classes offered with a minimum of "face time" in the classroom is really on the top of the list this year.

In addition, Classroom Instruction Material will be at cost to all Squadron Members with certification classes grouped for an easier trip through the classes.

A USPS and DSPS goal is to, at a minimum, get all Lake Superior boaters to a Costal Navigation Level and get other boaters to the Inland Navigation Level. More on the how's and when's will follow. Our District Education Officer, Bob Stierna, has an education interest form that assists members to guide, set, and achieve educational goals.

I'm really looking forward to the 2010 – 2011 watch year.



Old Fire Extinguishers

When was the last time you checked your fire extinguishers? Do you remember when you purchased them? Do you know what type they are?

Fire extinguishers in the market in the last decade were water filled, gas filled and chemical filled. Water and gas (CO2) filled extinguishers are inert and aren't going to hurt you. With dry chemical, you need to take precautions.

The older dry chemical fire extinguishers were charged with carbon tetrachloride or halon. Both can cause damage to the environment and are no longer found on newer extinguishers. The best way to find out what is inside is to contact your local fire extinguisher service company or fire department.

Newer extinguishers will have a pressure gauge to let you know if the pressure is adequate for its proper use. Make sure you check the gauge periodically to see if the pressure arrow is in the green zone. It is also important to periodically turn the unit upside down and shake back and forth to loosen the dry chemical which will settle to the bottom with time.

Rechargeable extinguishers can be refilled for less cost than a new one. If you do not want to refill, what do you do with the old one? Since the dry chemical con-

tainer is under pressure and some local laws consider them a hazard, the garbage can is out of the question. A unit under pressure, if crushed, can explode. Once the unit is discharged, there is no potential of an accident should the extinguisher be crushed during disposal. If a completely discharged extinguisher can be lawfully put way with the household waste, perhaps consider using it for practice.

When using a fire extinguisher, from a close, safe distance, point the nozzle at the base of the fire and spray with a sideways motion, left to right, right to left, using short bursts.

Safe boating is no accident!




River Quest Grows

Commander's Log

March 15, 2010

It has been a while since I have shared a Captain's log story. I figured it would be appropriate to rename the column Commander's Log.

As for my winter experience this year, I had very limited ice fishing on Lake Superior due to the lack of ice this season. I have written past columns about ice fishing at Cat, Outer, Stockton, and even close to Michigan Island. This year, no dice, no ice. A couple hair raising events, but not enough for documentation. This was a driving force in what happened on March 15.

My fishing craze has driven me to a different venture this day in March. My friend Corey and I made a swift decision to make the attempt to troll the south shore of Superior today. Short term planning for this included the 14' aluminum boat, 5HP motor, a couple gallons of gas, and 2 life jackets. We had 6 rods and reels equipped with the "secret" baits from last season. The only triumph that we wondered about was how we get the boat into open water. As some of you may know, the only actual small boat launch on this end of the lake is at the mouth of the Amnicon River. The only other places are in the bay and have FEET of ice blocking them. The Amnicon River's mouth is still fighting hard against the late effects of winter. (still frozen) Since my family cook book only has the recipe for freezing water, we had to look elsewhere. We could have traveled up the north shore to the McQuade road landing, or went farther up to Silver Bay, but what fun would that be with out a challenge. Which brings us to the Dutchman Creek. The river is flowing rapidly under and over the ice; it looks like a scene from one of those tsunami videos on the news. We know we can't just drop a boat in the river and walk it down into the lake. We need a better plan. We are sitting with a boat, on a trailer, about 100 yards from the lake. The beach is a mixture of sand, ice, and debris. One would think that pushing a small boat like this across the sand would be an easy task. This was not the case. The fact is that aluminum and sand make friction. I would guess about as much friction as a bare knee on carpet. After some grunting and groaning, we managed to find water. Now, this story isn't about the fishing. It is about the driving force that comes into a persons brain that says: "Hey, let's go fishing." It is not about how or why, it is just simply, let's go. (you know if we would have hammered the fish you would hear a better ending) We trolled around for a few short hours, basking in the sunshine. As the sun started its descent after only 1 bite and seeing one fish roll on the surface, we headed for shore. Now the uphill battle to the trailer seemed to be less cumbersome. I think the enjoyment of success on getting out to fish today made the trek worthwhile.



Here's a Spring/Summer recipe for <u>Dijon Chicken Salad</u> from Val Ouellette . Val sometimes uses canned chicken when making this on the boat, or just cooks up some chicken breasts ahead of time.

4 cups cubed cooked chicken

1 cup sliced celery

1 cup seedless green grapes halved

1 cup seedless red grapes, halved

1/4 cup chopped dried apricots

1/4 cup sliced green onions

3/4 cup mayonnaise

2 tablespoons honey

1 tablespoon Dijon mustard

1/2 teaspoon salt

1/8 teaspoon pepper

1/2 cup sliced almonds

Avocado (optional)

In a large bowl, combine the first 6 ingredients. In a small bowl, combine the mayonnaise, honey, mustard, salt and pepper. Pour into chicken mixture; toss to coat. Cover and refrigerate until serving. Serve on a lettuce lined plate and sprinkle with almonds. Top with avocado slices if you wish. Serves 6




