## **Educational Officer's Report**

I am making plans to prepare Essence for the winter. Where did the summer go? I hope everyone has many fine memories of the 2010 summer and all it offered us.

I have spent the summer contemplating what is the best direction to take the Duluth Squadrons Education Department. Balancing both time commitments and Squadron interest is a very tricky task.

Our Squadron has some of the best and most committed instructors. As you probably know, I really take boating safety and education very seriously. That does not mean I don't believe in fun, just the opposite. An Educated boater can have fun, be enthusiastic and remain safe.

This summer I had the privilege to remove 2 items from my bucket list. The first was to take a cruising vacation on Lake Superior up the North Shore to Canada. We visited Thunder Bay, Silver Islet and Thompson Island. I had the opportunity to put into practice many of the boating principals I have learned through the advanced courses. I Pre-plotted all courses for a good look at Time of Travel and Fuel Consumption. Prior to leaving, I calculated my total fuel consumption; any power boater knows it is less about time and more about fuel. I didn't want to get caught with a lack of the magic potion my boat so loves to consume and I also didn't want to have to purchase fuel in the upper bracket fuel zone of Isle Royal. I calculated 600 gallons consumed that week and happily report using only 591 gallons. I really got to know my boat and trust my knowledge. The second item was to do a crossing from Duluth to Bayfield in the dark. I have always wanted to put absolute trust into my electronics. This summer I had the opportunity to do just that. I awoke at 0300 to find wind and rain, not in my plans, on the Squadron Dock. I did a 2 hr prep including breakfast and departed at 0500. By this time the rain had let up but the wind was still an obstacle. Combining my GPS and Radar I slid through the Superior entrance and onto the lake. Waves were about 3' and quartering the front of the boat. Amazingly, for the first time, I felt all the movements of the boat. Without visual contact with the water, I positioned the boat and had a very smooth 12 knot ride. This smooth ride lasted until sunrise. When I could see the waves approaching I began to fight with them to hold course. I lost the "feel" of the boat and got a little jostled. About 2 hours into the journey the wind and wave direction changed to a following sea. I ramped up the speed to 18 knots and had a very enjoyable remainder of the trip.

As I look back at these trips I have realized the knowledge and confidence I have gained over the years. This knowledge was not all class work but also simple conversations other that share the love of boat-


children's awards ceremony (Tanner wears his to school almost every day). I was also very pleased this year to work as part of Admin Pat's team that did an incredible job.



#### Properties of Boating Line Determine its Use

Manufacturers are in the rope business. Most ropes used on board ships are called "lines." Boats have anchor, dock, towing, heaving and water skiing lines.

Larger lines on big boats are called hawsers

Lines can be purchased in nylon, polyester, polypropylene or natural fibers. Nylon is the strongest and most elastic of the commonly used synthetics. This makes nylon the choice for anchoring and mooring since its elasticity helps absorb shock loads. However for this same reason it is undesirable for use as halyards on sail boats.

Polyester is nearly as strong as nylon but has considerably less stretch. This is the material of choice for running rigging aboard sailboats.

Polypropylene is significantly less strong than either nylon or polyester and is more susceptible to chafe abrasion and deterioration from direct sunlight. Its prime value is that it floats. This is the line of choice for water skiing lines, small dingy painters and heaving lines.

Modern synthetic line requires only minimum care to ensure long and satisfactory use. If you observe the following guidelines, it will ensure long and satisfactory use:

Do not overload. A load of 75 percent of the line's working strength may permanently damage the line.

Avoid kinks in the line. They create stress, weaken the line and accelerate wear.


Avoid sharp bends in the line. Use a thimble to splice the line around. This makes the spliced eye more resistant to chafing.

Avoid contact with chemicals. Synthetic fiber lines are resistant to most chemicals, but why invite trouble.


Cleanse and rinse line regularly. Dirt and grit should be removed by hand washing and rinsed by hosing down.

Stow carefully. While modern synthetic line can b stowed wet, they should be coiled and

well ventilated.







#### Green Tomato Cake

a recipe from Val Ouellette

- 2 1/4 cups sugar
- 1 Cup Vegetable oil or melted shortening
- 3 Eggs
- 2 teaspoons vanilla
- 3 cups flour
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1 teaspoon baking powder

- 1 teaspoon cinnamon
- ½ teaspoon nutmeg
- 1 cup pecans or walnuts
- 1 cup raisins
- 2 ½ cups diced green tomatoes Coconut (optional)



Preheat oven to 350 degrees. In mixing bowl, beat sugar, vegetable oil or shortening, eggs and vanilla until smooth and creamy. Sift together the flour, salt, baking powder, cinnamon, and nutmeg; Slowly beat into egg mixture. Blend well. Stir in pecans, raisins and tomatoes. Pour into greased 9 X 13 inch pan. Top with coconut if desired. Bake for 1 hour, or until wooden pick or cake tester inserted in center comes out clean.






#### Sister City Visitors Enjoy Boating Hospitality


