### **Commander's Report**

Is summer coming? I have never seen a forty day East Wind before. With 37 degree surface water it has been less than comfortable on Park Point. We put the boats in the water on the 14<sup>th</sup> of May and I refuse to go back until the wind switches! That said, we should all be thankful when we look around the country and the world to see the devastation. We aren't dealing with fires, floods or 4-mile wide tornadoes.

I want to extend a heartfelt thank you to the 25 members who worked tirelessly to plan and execute our Annual Fitting Out Party. I frankly wasn't in "ship shape" to attend as I was dealing with a spring cold, laryngitis and was physically drained from launching and fitting out boats. I tried to thank folks at the event, but as always, some are missed. In addition, there was a lot of conversation at the event and a weak sound system so it was difficult for attendees to hear all the announcements.

The membership should be aware that the stress of a tough economy has profound effects on small non-profit groups like ours. In fact, as you look around, many organizations are folding just like regular businesses around the country. It is increasingly difficult to secure donations and to find individuals to bid on auction items. The pressure on this event to produce the revenue for this organization to exist has become extreme. After paying the event bills, which were minimal, we put about \$ 5,500 in the bank. That's about half as much as our top years and not even enough to cover the base cost of the Squadron Dock. So I can't emphasize enough to the members who weren't able to attend or didn't make a contribution, how important it is to support this event. It's never too late to make a tax deductable contribution or start planning for next year.

Your bridge officers are working tirelessly to find other avenues for revenue streams. A special thanks to P/C Todd Carlson and his efforts to make the Captain's Platter Fishing Contest one of those streams. This great organization is a small business and your bridge takes great pride in operating it like one. We have a lot of talented business folks in our group and we are always open to your feedback and suggestions to make certain that this Squadron is around for a very long time. I would also like to thank the Shrine and Shriners in our group for helping us and providing a beautiful venue to

host our event. The Shriners will using be our dock on August 20<sup>th</sup>for their summer picnic, so if you are at the dock, make them feel welcome and give them a hand if needed.

### **Educational Officer's Report**

Happy Summer. It looks to have the makings of a glorious boating season, along with an increase in boating traffic and incidents. As the DPS Education Officer, I have to ask the question "what can the Squadron Education Department do to help boaters be safer?"

Increasing safety awareness is the foundation of the USPS. Safety through EDUCATION has always been the message. The challenge for us is how we, as a squadron, get people to participate when "nobody has time." I try to always respect people's time commitment to Education. Committing one night a week for 10 - 12 weeks is often an impossible task. Hopefully with the help of technology, we can bridge the time gap and encourage participation in classes. Here is the The Website for DPS Education is going to be changed. Education web page will have links to course descriptions, public and member only. Also, there will be a link to a course waiting list. This list will consist of people interested in taking the course allowing us to provide the classes the membership is interested in. You will also have an opportunity to preregister for a class when it is offered, on line. Register 30 days prior for class and you only pay for the material. Under 30 days material will have a 30% surcharge to cover shipping and handling expenses the squadron will incur.

Classes can use Webinars to handle some class material. Sessions will normally be about 90 minutes and include subjects that can be taught in a Webinar. This will decrease time commitments to classes. I am currently reviewing all the classes for potential opportunities. The webinar would be on your home computer at a designated time.

Various seminars will be presented as Webinars. Every Thursday in July and August a different Seminar will be held. Preregistration will be required and participation is limited to 25 people. Seminar cost will be \$10.00 with the option to purchase the class material at the class. Preregistration will require payment.

#### **Boating's More Fun If You Can Handle Emergencies**

You are the skipper. What would you do in an emergency?

What if one of your passengers falls overboard? Don't allow passengers to sit on foredecks gunwales, engine boxes or transoms. Make sure that all passengers have boat shoes and don't move around when the boat is moving.

If someone falls overboard, the recovery procedure requires that the first observer shout "Man Overboard." Throw the person a life preserver or any floatation device and more than one is helpful. Assign someone to constantly point to the person in the water. As skipper, you should immediately stop the boat. Approach the man overboard against the wind and current carefully and slowly. For smaller boats, turn off the engine in gear. The best place to bring a person aboard is over the transom on a boat with a low freeboard.

What would you do if a fire broke out on your boat? First, it is always good practice to correct any condition on board that might cause a fire. Keep bilges clean and check for fuel leaks. Inspect electrical wiring and repair any bare wires or loose connections.

Fires often occur when fueling. Make sure you ventilate your engine compartment and keep the fuel nozzle against the fill pipe when fueling. Be sure to sniff bilges for vapors. Notify all on board of the fire and have them put on a life jacket. Turn off all fuel supplies and disconnect electric power. Find the source of the fire and put it out with a fire extinguisher. If you are unable to get the fire under control, put out a Mayday distress call on your marine radio. Get people off the boat and as far away as possible if you are unable to put the fire out.

Collisions are the most frequent type of boat accidents. Most collisions occur in daylight on the weekends when visibility is

excellent and the weather is good. The occupants of both boats need to be checked for injuries and give first aid. Call the Coat Guard if there are serious injuries and try to have a good estimate of your position. The operators of both boats, after caring for people and property affected, must file accident reports with local authorities.

Restricted visibility, bad weather or getting swamped are other events than could occur on the water, and you want to know how to handle and prevent them.

#### **Vessel Safety Check Day at Barkers Island June 18**



### **River Quest Draws Over 1000 Area Students**

River Quest 2011, was held May 9 – 12, 2011. For those who don't know what River Quest is, I will let you in on a "well kept secret". The River Quest program started 19 years ago. It is a program designed to teach 6<sup>th</sup> grade students from the Duluth/ Superior and surrounding area schools how the activity of businesses and people affect the St. Louis River and Harbor. The goal of River Quest is to provide a balanced view of the harbor, river, and estuary so students understand the multiple uses of a resource that forms the foundation of the Duluth/Superior community. Presenters for this year were: Corps of Engineers, Sappi Paper, New Page Paper, WLLSD, Duluth Sail & Power Squadron, Twin Ports Rip Currents, City of Duluth Comfort Systems, Murphy Oil USA, Great Lakes Aquarium & MN DNR MinnAqua Program, Duluth Seaway Port Authority & GLMRI, EPA & Superior National Forest, MN Sea Grant Program, US Coast

Guard & USCG Auxiliary. There also are numerous businesses who participate financially. Without them, the River Quest program would not be.

Our part of the program was and is to teach the students water safety and the proper use of Life Jackets.

This year there were over 1000 students attending, which is a record. This program has become so popular with the schools, that we now have a waiting list to attend. This year was the second year of 3  $\frac{1}{2}$  days of taking the students out on the Vista Star for half day sessions, for a total of seven trips.

ing System, or GPS, technology freely available for use outside the military. President Reagan had made a similar pronouncement in 1983, stating it was for the common good. This was a big deal in theory, but in practice, the highest-quality signal was still only available to the military, with an intentionally degraded signal designated for civilian use. This practice, known as Selective Availability, included several intentional, random errors to prevent enemy military from using it as a weapons guidance system. It wasn't foolproof, though, and President Clinton ordered Selective Availability turned off at midnight on May 1, 2000, saving the FAA millions of dollars a year in maintenance

costs.

The GPS receiver calculates its position based on signals from at least four different satellites, by measuring the time it takes for a message to travel between the receiver and the satellite. Most GPS errors are the result of the receiver's clock being "off" by as little as one microsecond.


