



Commanders Report 2011

After a frantic high pressure pace in 2010, some wanted a bit more relaxed 2011. In some respects, we've accomplished that, but we certainly haven't been asleep at the helm. We decided to keep things fresh with new ideas as well as continue old traditions.

Let's take a cruise through the waters of 2011. It all started with one of the best Changes of Watch in recent history; bagpipes, Thunder Bay's Commander & our newly appointed D-10 Commander and his family were among the highlights.

The next day found us at our winter dock party with record numbers and record temperatures welcoming our special guests, the Skelley's. Before we knew it, we were back at the dock for spring cleanup, the Captain's Platter Fishing Contest and the East West Sailboat Regatta. Dock cleanup day has always been a right of spring. Unfortunately, the weather this spring was hurricane/snowstorm-like, but dock-masters Solberg and Pratt still managed to pull something off. Meanwhile, the latter two events continue to grow under the leadership of P/C Todd Carlson and Admin Officer Pat Joyal. We continue to conduct large numbers of VSC's at both events as well as introduce other boaters to the Squadron. For the season, just over 270 VSC's were performed. Thanks to these two very popular events, dozens of new members have been recruited to our squadron.

The Duluth Sail and Power Squadron participated once again in the Annual River Quest event that educates more than 1,000 area 6th graders on various water-related topics. This event takes place on board the Vista Star tour vessel in which kids are taken out twice daily over the span of a week. The DSPS station educated kids on the importance of life jackets and water safety.

Fourth of July has been a time of camaraderie and celebration for members at the dock. It was announced this year that the 2012 4^{th} will be a special one as Bridge member Jason Schmitke and his fiancé' Leslie will be getting married with a Squadron flare—a wedding reception at the dock. Wow.

As we moved into fall, our traditional Corn Roast continues to get better with each passing year. Record attendance of new and old members and great weather welcomed everyone. More than 60 kids participated in games and events; truly making this a family event. The Corn Roast continues to attract potential new members as well and the talk is definitely around the harbor.

This year, I am also proud to announce a brand new effort. Admin Officer Pat Joyal formed a partnership with Mentor Duluth. These are kids who are waiting for special mentors in their lives. We invited 25 kids to our dock facility for a fun-filled afternoon of boating safety education, lunch and a trip out on Lake Superior. A well crafted press release even attracted the news media to this event

with the M/V Purrecious Time serving as the press boat for TV crews.

One other annual collaboration that we are proud of is the partnership with the area Shriners. We've developed a tradeout with them using their building for our annual Fitting Out Party fund raiser, and having the Shrine summer picnic at our Dock facility. This partnership

More than 60 members came out to hear the presentation and lend their support to the project. This was followed up by the Annual Christmas Party and great cheer as a full-room of members gathered to celebrate the season and then venture to the opening of Bentleyville Tour of Lights at Bayfront Park.

Rounding out the year, our education department has done a fabulous job in offering a variety of classes to both the public and membership. There were three Safe-Boating classes and one Piloting class. As Commander, I attended the Safe-Boating classes to promote membership in the Squadron and I also attended the Piloting class. In addition, we held seminars on anchoring, weather, rules of the road and trailering. We already have courses planned for January 2012 in Advanced Piloting, Weather and Safe Boating.

As I submit this report the overall health of this Squadron is strong. The finances and leadership are solid and with new younger members coming aboard, the future looks bright. That said, the challenge of finding new leaders in a very busy society is a real one. All volunteer organizations struggle to fill positions it seems these days. Therefore, I've focused hard this year on stream-lining all aspects of this organization to make it easier and more attractive to serve.

In closing, I was also pleased to have attended both the spring and fall district conferences. It is always motivating to connect with fellow squadron leadership. 




Happy Holidays All,







Harbor History



On November 27, 1905 a gale swept Lake Superior with snow, ice pellets, freezing temperatures and mountainous seas causing havoc all over the big lake. The 450 foot ore carrier, Mataafa, had left the Duluth harbor with a full load. The Captain decided to return to the Duluth harbor entry to seek shelter. The Mataafa was caught by the current and





pushed off course. The hull hit bottom, smashed the north pier and soon lost power. The ship and all on board were at the mercy of the wind, waves, and current; it was driven aground and broken into three pieces. Nine crew members died of exposure before conditions subsided enough for the remaining 15 sailors to be rescued on November 29. Amazingly, the battered Mataafa was not only refloated, but it was repaired and operated until 1964 (photo left).

Wearing Your Life Jacket

Boaters enjoy the feel of sun and spray. So it's tempting to boat without wearing a life jacket – especially on nice days. But modern life jackets are available in a wide variety of shapes, colors, and sizes. Many are thin and flexible. Some are built right into fishing vests or hunter coats. Others are inflatable — as compact as a scarf or fanny pack until they hit water, when they automatically fill with air.

There's no excuse not to wear a life jacket on the water!

Things to Know:

- Certain life jackets are designed to keep your head above water and help you remain in a position which permits proper breathing.
- To meet U.S. Coast Guard requirements, a boat must have a U.S. Coast Guard-approved Type I, II, III, or V life jacket for each person aboard. Boats 16 feet and over must have at least one Type IV throwable device as well.
- All states have regulations regarding life jacket wear by children.
- Adult-sized life jackets will not work for children. Special life jackets are available. To work correctly, a life jacket must be
 worn, fit snugly, and not allow the child's chin or ears to slip through.
- Life jackets should be tested for wear and buoyancy at least once each year. Waterlogged, faded, or leaky jackets should be discarded.
- Life jackets must be properly stowed.

A life jacket — especially a snug-fitting flotation coat or deck-suit style — can help you survive in cold water.

How Do Life Jackets Save Lives?




- · When capsized in rough water.
- When sinking in unexpectedly heavy sea conditions.
- When thrown from the boat as a result of a collision.
- When injured by rocks or submerged objects.
- When unconscious from carbon monoxide fumes.
- When tossed into freezing water.
- When thrown off balance while fishing.
- When unable to swim because of heavy or waterlogged clothing.

All recreational boats must carry one wearable lifejacket (Type I, II, III or Type V lifejacket) for each person aboard. A Type V lifejacket provides performance of either a Type I, II, or III lifejacket (as marked on its label) and must be used according to the label requirements. Any boat 16ft and longer (except canoes and kayaks) must also carry one throwable lifejacket (Type IV lifejacket).

Many boat insurance companies will offer discounts on boating insurance to boaters who successfully complete America's Boating Course. And, this beginner boating class will give you the knowledge needed to obtain a boat license or safety certification in many states.

Boating Safety Topics

The boat and water safety course topics include:

- Introduction to Boating: types of power boats; sailboats; outboards; paddle boats; houseboats; different uses of boats; various power boating engines; jet drives; family boating basics.
- Boating Law: boat registration; boating regulation; hull identification number; required boat safety equipment; operating safely and reporting accidents; protecting the marine environment; Federal boat law; state boating laws; personal watercraft requirements.
- Boat Safety Equipment: personal flotation devices ("life jackets"); fire extinguishers; sound-producing devices; visual-distress signals; dock lines and rope; first aid kit; anchors and anchor lines; other boating safety equipment.
- Safe Boating: bow riding; alcohol and drug abuse; entering, loading, and trimming a boat; fueling portable and permanent tanks; steering with a tiller and a wheel; docking, undocking and mooring; knots; filing a float plan; checking equipment, fuel, weather and tides; using charts; choosing and using an anchor; safe PWC handling; general water safety.
- Navigation: the U.S. Aids to Navigation system; types of buoys and beacons; navigation rules (sometimes referred to as right-of-way rules); avoiding collisions; sound signals; PWC "tunnel vision."
- Boating Problems: hypothermia; boating accidents and rescues; man overboard recovery; capsizing; running aground; river hazards; strainers: emergency radio calls; engine problems; equipment failures; carbon monoxide (CO); other boating and PWC problems.
- Trailering, Storing and Protecting Your Boat: types of trailers; trailer brakes, lights, hitches, tires, and bearings; loading, balancing, and towing (and backing) a trailer; boat launching and retrieving; boat storage and theft protection; launching, retrieving and storing a PWC.
- Hunting and Fishing, Water-skiing and River Boating: carrying hunting gear and weapons in a boat; fishing from a boat; water-skiing safety guidelines and hand signals; water-skiing with a PWC; navigating Rivers, and other boating tips.

The winter solstice occurs exactly when the axial tilt of a planet's polar hemisphere is farthest away from the star that it orbits. Earth's maximum axial tilt to our star, the Sun, during a solstice is 23° 26'. More evidently from high latitudes, a hemisphere's winter solstice occurs on the shortest day and longest night of the year, when the sun's daily maximum elevation in the sky is the lowest. Since the winter solstice lasts only a moment in time, other terms are often used for the day on which it occurs, such as midwinter, the longest night or the first day of winter.
