The Thrill of the Catch

Throughout the year I pride myself in spending time on the water in various ways, whether it's wading in the Brule chasing steelhead, staring down an 8 inch hole in the ice waiting for a walleye to tug

on my line or trolling across the Gitch washing lures hoping for my next personal best fish. During this time I find myself constantly wondering what it will take to get that next fish to bite. Most of the time the fish I pursue are fickle creatures where it takes getting out of the norm to capitalize on that next bite, however, once in a blue moon Mother Nature gives you a day on the water that makes up for all of those slower days.

This past August produced a few of these days as I joined P/C Todd Carlson and a few others on a "fishing trip of a lifetime" bound for Isle Royale. Our route was planned to take us all the way around the rock with plenty of time set aside for taking in the surreal natural beauty of our Lake Superior National Park. We spent a few hours each day trolling for lunker lake trout as we made our way around the island, and luck would have it we managed to land a few of those lunkers.

On one of our picture perfect mornings while working our way down the south side of the Isle I had the pleasure of hooking into what was soon to be my next personal best Lake Trout. The fish had hit the lure hard making for a quick release from the downrigger and had the reel producing a sound I had only heard on Lake Michigan while fishing for King Salmon. I quickly picked up the rod and began what was soon to be an arm numbing experience while the fish on the line decided that he wasn't going to go easily. After what seemed to be half the morning of picking up ground on the fish only for him to spool the line back off we had our first sighting in the crystal clear waters of the lake. It was indeed a fish of a lifetime! We had cleared the rest of our lines to make a landing strip for my Lake Trout and managed to cleanly net it and bring it aboard. It was a beautiful fish measuring 38 inches in length and nearly 2 feet in girth. After a couple quick photos and some measurements it was time for this fish to go back into the lake. I commonly release Lake Trout unlike Salmon, these

majestic fish can reach ages upwards of 30+ years; this fish based on its size was nearing that age and was well worthy of living the rest of his life out on

the bottom.

It's hard to say whether the release of this greenstone gem was more enjoyable than the catch. However, after climbing down and lying on the swim deck to gently put this fish back in the water it was beginning to become apparent that this release was going to be. This fish had put up a fight and had used up all of its energy to avoid what he must have thought to be the end. After roughly 20 minutes of massaging its belly and raising its head to help release the air in the swim bladder he began to come back to life. I could begin to feel him twitch his tail as he was trying to tell me he was nearing ready to go. His energy began to build and he made a couple half hearted darts towards the bottom but I knew he wasn't quite there yet. A couple more minutes had passed and then with one big shake, he shook loose and began his

trek back down to the bottom.

It's moments like that, that keep the thrill of the catch ever present in our minds.




D-10 Summer Rendezvous




