Administrative Officer's Report


Greetings,

Executive Officer's Report

Let's not forget about the little things...

It's true, sometimes the simplest item overlooked can end up costing you substantially. As we brace for our annual spring thaw and start to gather our lists to fit the boats out, don't forget the little things.

Last year one of these little things was double-checking a strainer cap to ensure it was tight. Every year during haul out, I clean my strainers as I prepare for the hard. Last year in the process of getting back on the water I overlooked double checking that these were tight. On an initial run across the bay to our beloved Squadron dock, this overlooked item caused the port engine to overheat as it had vapor locked. After allowing the engine to cool, I went through the motions of identifying the issue. After looking over all the usual suspects, changing an impeller that looked perfectly fine, a thermostat that tested out and checking coolant, I came across the strainer top that was about a quarter-turn loose. Lo and behold, the problem was solved. Or so I thought...

A week later I readied my boat for the annual Jaws Derby fishing contest and headed over to Barkers Island Marina for the weekend. As I entered the channel and came off of plane, that same engine that had overheated apparently had a bit of internal damage. It began knocking really loud, as if someone dropped a brick of firecrackers in the bilge of the boat. After numerous consultations from fellow boaters it was decided that the end result of this event was I had dropped a piston seal due to the overheating of the engine.

Being it was a late summer, with ice into June, this was no way to start the summer. With help from fellow squadron



members, I was guided in the right direction of whom, how and where to get an engine pulled, bored and rebuilt (in a hurry). The process took about a week, from diagnosis to placing the engine back into the boat, and back off the dock.

I truly believe had it not been through the network of squadron members, this process would have been stretched into at least twice the time, and easily more than twice the cost. It truly is the little things that we overlook that cause us the most pain (boating) and the most pleasure (members).

With a mild winter and low fuel prices, it's looking like 2015 will be a great year. So, get excited,


