












January Meeting

Annual Meeting at VIP







The Duluth Sail and Power Squadron is hosting its annual fishing contest Saturday, June 11, 2016 from 6 a.m. to 4 p.m. Tournament headquarters is at the Power Squadron Dock in Allouez bay (44th Ave East and the St. Louis Bay). \$20 a person for adults and free for kids 15 and under. Awards for 1st, 2nd, and 3rd in five divisions: Lake Trout, Walleye, Chinook Salmon, Coho Salmon, Brown trout. This is a Lake Superior and/or St. Louis River basin contest.

The Captain's Platter award is for the boat with the greatest combined weight of the largest of each species listed. You do not need all four species to be eligible; it is possible to win with only one fish.

We are awarding \$300 cash to the first person to weigh in an 8-pound fish. It must be of one of the classes listed and must weigh exactly 8 pounds.

The Duluth Sail and Power Squadron will be performing Vessel Safety Checks on a voluntary basis to those who wish to have their boats inspected. They will be checked for the needed equipment for Lake Superior and the St. Louis River basin. United States Power Squadron has teamed up with the U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary for this national program.

Tickets and rules are available at Marine General, The Bait Box, Fisherman's Corner, Northwest Outlet or at the Squadron Dock Friday night before the contest.

In Memoriam: Richard Bibby

In 2015, we lost a beloved member of the maritime community.

Richard "Dick" Bibby had numerous awards and commendations for his support, dedication and love of the working waterfront. He sailed the Great Lakes prior to World War II and during the war for the U.S. Maritime Administration as a Merchant Marine sailing the high seas. He was awarded a prestigious medal for his bravery and service to the citizens of Russia during convoys to Murmansk.

Dick had a long and successful 41-year career with Hanna Mining Company. He had served in many capacities for Hanna, including Fleet Personnel Manager, and retired in 1985 as a Vessel Agent. It was during this career that he transferred to Duluth, Minnesota, on August 28, 1956.

He was a charter member and was very active in several Marine Historical Societies including the Great Lakes, Detroit and Toronto. He was Historian of the Great Lakes Naval Association. He served on the Lake Superior Marine Museum Association and the International Shipmaster's Association, was Past Commander of the Duluth Chapter of the U.S. Power Squadron and served as secretary for over 10 years with

the Harbor Club. In 1978, Richard was honored by the Twin Ports' maritime community by being named the "Marine Man of the Year."

Dick remained active and participated in many groups including the Maritime Waterfront Propeller Club, he was Past President of the Duluth-Superior Harbor Club, a beloved member of the Sand Point Yacht Club and, for over 35 years, enjoyed attending ROMEO's (Retired Old Men Eating Out) every Friday at noon.

This display is but a small glimpse into one of the finest personal maritime collections around, spanning his 93 years of life. It includes such precious items as the Tug *New York*, which

he built from the keel up and sailed aboard as a kid, the sextant Dick used for navigating in the Merchant Marine, and some of his favorite publications and plaques honoring his milestones. Enjoy, and as Dick would say, "Keep her between the buoys!"
