

Ahoy DSPS Members -

As morning broke over the power squadron dock, my father from the fatlands of North Dakota awoke and said "you beter have the cofee going, because it is cold out." When I stepped of Ms. Ladybug the breeze from the northeast bit through my thin pajama pants, I could hear the lake crashing in the distance and I thought, why not – we are going to poke our nose out the Superior entry. Welcome to Captain's Plater.

As the crew awoke on cofee and donuts, we were bundled up more like an ice fshing adventure, rather than a nice early summer fshing contest. Lines were cut and we motored out along with most of our squadron dock feet.

As I was sitng on the unenclosed fy bridge with my father (did I menton this was his frst tme staying overnight on a boat and fshing the contest), we rounded the red buoy at the end of the dock and he asked what the col-

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or of the buoys meant. I explained, red – right – return, and he commented "so then why is that one on the left?" As we turned to the right into the Superior entry, the swells were rising and the boat began to rock. About halfway through the entry, myself as a Captain was taking into consideration three generators of Yecoshenko's on board and if they were up to the voyage. As we passed Superior light, my Dad mentoned "there are white caps son" – I said you are very observant, but at that tme the swells were manageable. Two minutes later the swells became very short and as the bow rose it dove into the next one and washed the windshield and fy bridge, including myself and my father. At that point, I didn't hear anything from my wife, which wasn't a good thing, later to find out she was holding the cofee and breakfast on the stove, literally. As a responsible Captain, we turned the vessel around and as always the following seas were our friend.

We entered the calm waters of the bay and fshed alongside most of the feet, playing bumper boats. I do have to admit that besides Dad, we had another frst that day – we caught our frst walleye on Ms. Ladybug!! Thanks to Bruce for catching and Dad for landing.

All in all it reminds us to be safe on the water and sometmes we have to change our foat plan, for us, it was a way to ensure that Dad comes again next year.

Greetings Everyone – I hope you are enjoying as much time on the water as possible these days! We had a great Spring ABC class and also had 3 squadron members complete the Seamanship course. Our next ABC will be held in October, and if we have 5 or more interested folks Les has offered to do another Seamanship course this Fall. Please spread the word - these classes are great to meet fellow boaters, learn and maintain your boating skills, and remind you to keep safety in the forefront as you enjoy the water.



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Speaking of safety, we have been given a great opportunity to promote boating safety by

collecting data through a US Coast Guard Grant to our America's Boating Course students by the use of Crowdsourcing:

Crowdsourcing & Recreational Boating - A high-tech way to gather and use boating safety statistics with mobile devices is being pioneered by the National Safe Boating Council and East Carolina University. Traditionally, gathering boating safety statistics has focused on accident reports and resulting data is then used to identify accident patterns that lead to regulations or education for boaters related to activities and behaviors.

SOBOS (Self-Reported On-Water Boat Operator Survey) is a new iOS and Android app intended to change this negative paradigm. Instead of cataloguing only bad behavior, SOBOS collects

survey data from boaters who act safely. In other words, it provides information about normal, non-accident-based recreational boaters that the developers will compare to

recreational boating accidents. Currently in beta test, SOBOS will test whether crowdsourcing is a valid recreational boating data collection technique.

The mobile app has two components. First, SOBOS asks boaters to fill out a short survey that should take less than 10 minutes to get anonymous information about the boater and his boat shortly before leaving on a planned boating trip. Second, SOBOS asks the boat operator to permit the app to track a short span of his next on-water excursion. Like the survey, all on-water data points are anonymous so only date, time, latitude /longitude, speed, and bearing are tracked.

Using the data shared by boaters, SOBOS developers plan to build a situational awareness recreational boater network that enables boat operators to filter information displayed on a chart screen to display only operator-selected information as well as a risk-rating based on current conditions.

Again, SOBOS is totally anonymous and no personally identifying information is collected. SOBOS is only interested in enhancing recreational boating safety and we hope that USPS members can help! To participate in this public service, visit SOBOS.org to download the app.

Greetings Duluth Sail & Power Squadron members,

My article this issue is a bit different than I would typically write, but on May 30, I attended the Duluth Superior Film Festival opening night film entitled "Virginia Minnesota." The film is not about the City of Virginia, rather a young girl who is named Virginia, but the entire movie was filmed along Lake Superior between Duluth and Grand Marais (for those of you that do not know me and Jason both grew up in Grand Marais). The description of the movie "About two young women, torn apart by a childhood tragedy, unexpectedly reunite and embark on an illuminating 24-hour journey, where they unlock memories of long forgotten innocence and what it means to truly believe" (Virginia Minnesota). Without ruining the film, I just want to talk a bit about a couple of the myths and legends featured in the show.

In one of the scenes, the women in the movie run into a traveling troupe, one of the actors in this troupe is dressed as the

Wendigo. This mythical creature is said to have resided in the north woods of Minnesota, surrounding the Great Lakes Region. This creature is monstrous in appearance and is associated with many inhumanely taboos. It may be known by several names, including Windigo, Witigo, Witkio, and Wee-Too-Go, each of which translates to "the evil spirit that devours mankind." It was pretty scary looking.

Another mentioned is the ghost fleet of Lake Superior, specifically the Bannockburn, which disappeared in 1902. In November of 1902, the Bannockburn set out onto Lake Superior with bushels of wheat and a crew of 20 men from Ontario. About 9:00 am that morning, it suffered light grounding, but did not suffer much damage. About 50 miles southeast of Passage Island and northeast of Keweenaw Point, the Captain of the Algonquin passed the Bannockburn and that it seemed to be traveling well, despite a storm. The Captain of the Algonquin returned to his work on his own ship, but then looked back towards the Bannockburn only about five minutes later and it was just gone. All that was


ever found of the ship was a lifeboat oar and a life preserver with its strings tied together on December 12. Speculation is that it could have been the weather, other thoughts are that there was a boiler explosion, the shoals near Caribou Island, or the minor accident that happened when leaving Port Arthur.

There were some people that we know that were extras in the film, so besides trying to figure out landmarks, it was fun to see friends in the movie. If you get a chance, it is a great film!

From a financial perspective, we have had our first of two major fundraisers for the year and both were successful again. Thank you to everyone that helped out or attended our annual Fitting Out event. Captain's Platter was this past weekend and a successful event as always, thank you to Todd Carlson and his crew for putting on a fantastic fishing contest. We will be scheduling our annu-

Secretary Safety Tips

With so many articles, news briefs, and classes that are out there regarding safe boating practices it still blows my mind how often I see careless behaviors out on the water and at the dock. There are endless suggestions on how to be safe, I've listed just a few below:

- -Partner in Command/Assistant Skipper
- -Proper Use of Life Jackets
- -Docking Plan/Safe Spot
- -Common Sense (avoid crowded areas, be alert)
- -Weather Awareness
- -Vessel Safety Checks

As those were just some of the basics that came to me there are hundreds of other great tips available to ensure safety within the boating community. This got me also thinking of the importance of getting back to



the slip and continuing to be safe and smart once docked. A basic rule we have as we approach the marina is having our 8-year-old daughter in her "safe spot". This is a spot that she sits so she is out of the way and silent until the boat is docked safely. Many of you have also heard her yelling "getting on or getting off" from Laulaja in Harbor Cove Marina. That is another one of our rules for her every-time she gets on or off our boat. It keeps Chad and I more alert so if she slipped between we could react immediately. It may sound like a minimal thing, but the marina group is aware and very receptive to the loud and long "getting on and getting off" sounds of that happy little marina rat we call Dakota!

Hope we can continue to be the squadron that leads by example when it comes to safety on and off the water!

This was a great event with a very good turnout.







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
There were a lot of great giveaway prizes to sign up for: a shot gun, a freezer full of meat, and of course the silent and live auction.

DOCK CLEANUP 2018




